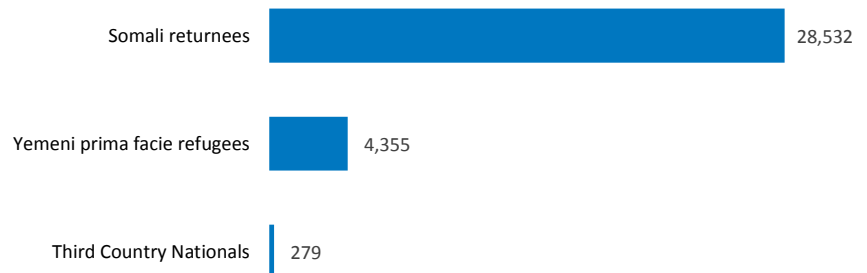

### HIGHLIGHTS

- During the reporting period, 10 boats arrivals in Somalia from Yemen, carrying a total of 309 individuals (116 Yemenis and 193 Somalis).
- In Puntland 6 boats carrying a total of 208 individuals (31 Yemenis and 177 Somalis). Of the new arrivals, 156 went to the Bossaso reception center and were registered by UNHCR in direct collaboration with local authorities and partners.
- In Somaliland 4 boats carrying a total of 101 individuals (85 Yemenis and 16 Somalis). Of the new arrivals, 101 went to the reception center and were registered by UNHCR in direct collaboration with local authorities and partners.

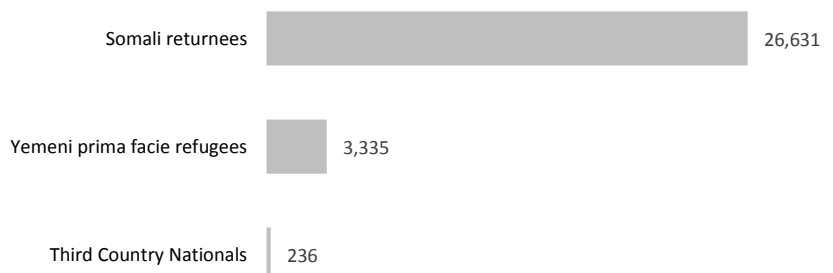
#### Population of concern

#### 2015 Population of concern

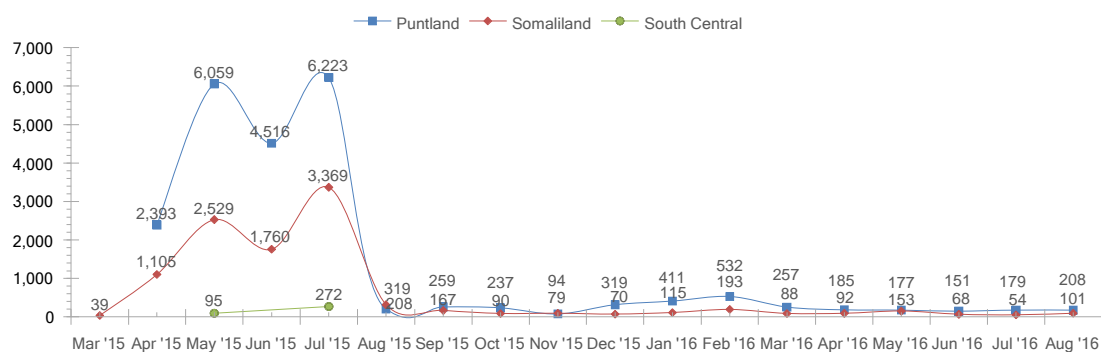
A total of **30,202** people of concern in 2015

## UPDATE ON ACHIEVEMENTS

### Operational Context

#### Somaliland

- Since March 2015, a total of 10,396 new arrivals (3,628 families) have been recorded in Somaliland, including 2,264 Yemenis, 7,995 Somalis, 116 Ethiopians and 27 individuals of other nationalities.

#### Puntland

- Since March 2015, a total of 22,393 new arrivals have been recorded in Puntland, including 2,091 Yemenis, 20,166 Somalis, 95 Ethiopians and 41 individuals of other nationalities.

### Achievements

#### Protection

#### Somaliland

- This reporting period saw the arrival of three boats at the port in Berbera: on 3 August, a boat carrying 50 individuals (43 Yemenis and 7 Somalis), 4 individuals were returning to Berbera for the second time. A second vessel on 10 August, with 26 individuals (22 Yemenis and 4 Somalis). Finally, a third boat on 11 August, carrying a total of 17 individuals (13 Yemenis and 4 Somalis).
- The new arrivals did not report any cases of armed, physical violence or GBV during their journey. Basic needs including water, food and emergency health care was provided by DRC, UNHCR and Somali Red Crescent Society (SRCS) teams. CCBRS conducted vulnerability assessment for the provision of Onward Transportation Allowance (OTA) by IOM.
- The entry formalities were duly conducted by the Government agencies and the Immigration office operating at the sea-port of entry. All new arrivals were documented and accommodated at the Reception Centre.

### Puntland

- During the reporting period, six boats carrying a total of 208 individuals (31 Yemenis and 177 Somalis) arrived at the port in Bossaso, 156 of whom went to the Reception Center.
- The new arrivals were assisted with refreshments provided by DRC, while transport from the port to the Reception Centre was supported by IOM. All new arrivals underwent Biometric registration and were issued with refugee certificates co-signed by UNHCR and Ministry of Interior. Somali returnees were also issued with Proof of registration documents.
- Reinstallation grants were provided to the Somali returnees in their area of origin.
- Subsistence allowance for an initial period of three months was issued to Yemeni arrivals. An amount of \$100 USD for the primary applicant, \$20 USD for each additional adult member of the household, \$10 USD for each additional child and an additional \$20 USD for those with severe disabilities.

## Health

### Somaliland

- No medical cases were reported among the new arrivals.

### Puntland

- Yemeni refugees continue to receive medical assistance through UNHCR Implementing partner Gruppo per le Relazioni Transculturali (GRT) during biometric registration, in case of medical emergency and after registration for all other cases. However, greater psychosocial support is needed for all Yemeni arrivals.

## Food Security and Nutrition

### Somaliland

- DRC provided cooked meals to all new arrivals accommodated at the Reception Centre.

**Puntland**

- Drinking water and sanitation was provided at the Reception Centre in Bossaso by UNHCR through the Ministry of the Interior.

**Somaliland**

- All new arrivals had access to water and sanitation at the Reception Centre.

- Among the 76 new arrivals, 41 vulnerable individuals were provided with core-relief items and 7 females with Dignity Kits.

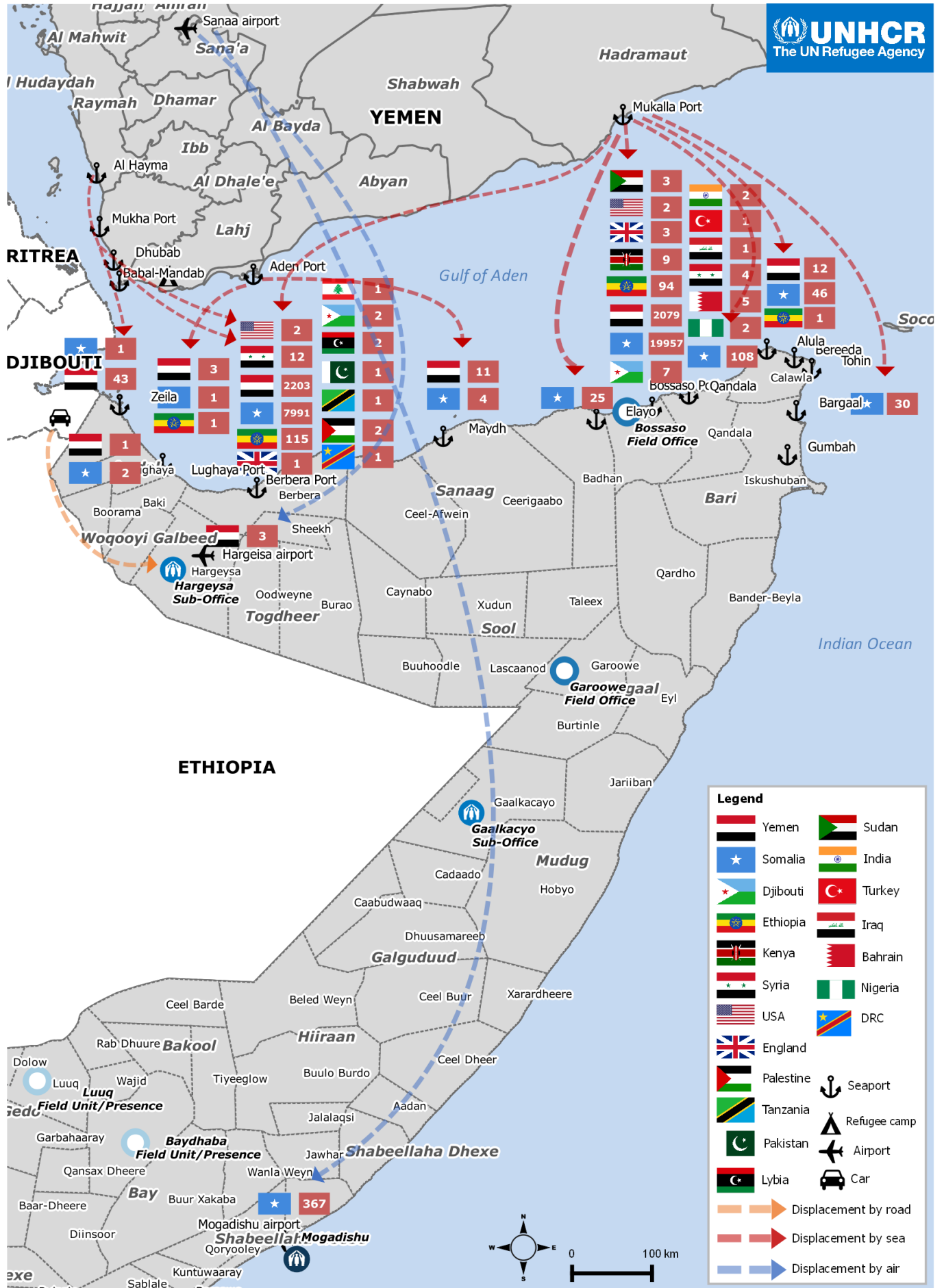
**Somaliland**

**Puntland**

- During the reporting period, 86 Somali returnees were provided with Onward Transport Assistance (OTA) to enable them to reach their places of origin.
