Protection of Civilians Weekly Report

3 - 9 January 2007

Of note this week


In the Gaza Strip:

- Ceasefire: (1) 8 Palestinians were injured inside the Gaza Strip by IDF gunfire fired from northern areas along the border fence; (2) 12 homemade rockets were fired by Palestinians towards Israel; (3) IDF gunboats opened fire at Palestinian fishermen; and (4) a member of Islamic Jihad was called by an alleged IDF officer and told to evacuate his house before a planned air-strike. Family and neighbours surrounded the house and no air-strike was carried out. This is the first time that such an incident has been reported since the ceasefire.
- Internal violence: (1) After PA Chairman Abbas' declaration on 1 January that the Hamas Executive Security Forces (ESF) was illegal, internal factional violence in Gaza Strip intensified armed clashes between Fatah and Hamas supporters and internal family feuds left 18 Palestinians dead and more than 121 injured. In reaction, the PA Ministry of Interior revealed plans to increase the size of the ESF from 5,500 to 12,000 members; and (2) On 7 January a Peruvian photographer from AFP, who had been abducted by Palestinian militants in Gaza, was released unharmed after six days of captivity.

In the West Bank:

- Four Palestinians were killed, and 30 others injured during IDF operations in the West Bank. All of the fatalities and the majority of the injuries occurred during an IDF incursion into the centre of Ramallah city which caused significant property destruction.
- Over three days, IDF soldiers occupied a Palestinian house in Al 'Arrub camp (Hebron).
 The six member family was locked in one room. Extensive damage to the house was reported.
- IDF soldiers and Israeli settlers from Beit Hadassah (Hebron) prevented Palestinians accompanied by a team from B'Tselem from walking on Al Shuhada Street, a main thoroughfare in Hebron, despite a court ruling issued on 29 December 2006 allowing Palestinian pedestrians access to the street.
- The Israeli High Court of Justice issued an eviction order for residents of the Al Hadidiya village in the northern Jordan Valley. The court ruled that the population of the village (about 80 people) constituted a threat to the settler's security in the area (Roi settlement), and order their eviction by 10 February 2007. No resettlement area was suggested by the court.
- 107 flying checkpoints were observed; 106 search and arrest campaigns, mostly in Bethlehem and Hebron; 125 Palestinians detained/arrested, mostly in Hebron and Nablus.
- Internal violence: (1) Four Palestinians were injured as a result of Palestinian internal violence. Clashes between Fatah and Hamas supporters as well as kidnappings/attempted kidnappings and attacks against private property were reported; and (2) Palestinian governmental officials have been under attack by internal violence. The Deputy Mayor of Nablus was kidnapped for two days. The deputy minister of the Ministry of Interior was kidnapped and injured. Unknown gunmen shot at the office of Dr. Salam Fayyad, the former minister of Finance. During a kidnapping attempt, masked gunmen shot at the acting mayor of Al Bireh municipality.

1. Physical Protection¹



Gaza Strip:

- **3 January:** A Palestinian was injured when IDF soldiers at the border fence opened fired at a group of Palestinians in the former Dugit settlement north of Beit Lahia.
- **4 January:** Four Palestinians were injured when IDF soldiers at the border fence opened fire in the direction of farmers working north of Beit Lahia.
- **7 January:** A Palestinian was injured when IDF soldiers at the border fence opened fire at a group of Palestinians north of Beit Lahia.
- **8 January:** A Palestinian was injured when IDF soldiers stationed at an observation post north of the Erez Industrial Zone opened fire at a group of Palestinians northeast of Beit Lahia.
- 9 January: A Palestinian was injured when IDF soldiers stationed at an observation post north of the Erez Industrial Zone opened fire in the direction of a group of people northeast of Beit Lahia.

West Bank:

- 4 January: An Israeli settler was injured near Al Lubban ash Sharqiya (Nablus) when his car was stoned near the village.
- **4 January:** A 19 year-old Palestinian man from Ad Doha town (Bethlehem) was injured and detained when IDF soldiers opened fire at him after surrounding his house.
- **4 January:** A 20 year-old Palestinian man from Ad Doha town (Bethlehem) was injured by a rubber-coated metal bullet when IDF soldiers opened fire at Palestinian stone throwers during a military operation in the town.
- 4 January: At around 3:30pm the IDF carried out a large-scale military incursion into Ramallah city (Ramallah). An Israeli undercover unit, accompanied by an IDF convoy of armoured vehicles and bulldozers entered Ramallah city centre to carry out a search and arrest campaign for a wanted Palestinian. Exchanges of gunfire erupted between the IDF and Palestinian gunmen. Four Palestinian civilians were killed and another 19 were injured (13 by live ammunition and six by rubber-coated metal bullets). Significant damage was reported to at least 45 vehicles by IDF bulldozers. The IDF also detained four Palestinians who were released the following morning. The Israeli DCL has confirmed an investigation into the operation has been launched.
- **5 January**: Seven Palestinians and one Israeli activist were injured by rubber-coated metal bullets during a demonstration held in Bil'in (Ramallah) against the construction of the Barrier in the village.
- 6 January: A 20 year-old Palestinian man from Biddya (Salfit) was injured when IDF soldiers physically assaulted him at the Deir Ballut checkpoint.
- **8 January:** A 13 year-old Palestinian boy from Sarra (Nablus) was injured by a rubber-coated metal bullet when the IDF opened fire at Palestinian stone throwers during a search and arrest campaign in the village.

Other incidents (not involving casualties):

- 3 January: IDF soldiers stationed at the borderline opened fire for ten minutes in the direction of Palestinian shepherds east of Al Bureij camp. No injuries were reported.
- **5 January:** Egyptian Security forces detonated a tunnel located under the Philadelphia corridor opposite the Al Salam Quarter south of Rafah.
- 6 January: IDF soldiers stationed at IDF Kissufim military camp opened fire for 15 minutes towards an area east of Al Qarara. No injures were reported.
- **9 January:** A member of Islamic Jihad was called by a person claiming to be the IDF and told to evacuate his house before planned air-strikes. Family and neighbours surrounded the house and no air-strike was carried out.

2. Palestinian internal violence and other incidents

[Casualties recorded in this section relate to Palestinian inter-factional fighting, family and community disputes and reckless use of weapons. Also reported in this section are casualties indirectly related to the conflict such as incidents involving Unexploded Ordnance (UXO), traffic accidents between Israeli and Palestinians in the oPt and deaths resulting from delay in receiving medical treatment at a checkpoint or during a military operation/curfew. These casualties are not recorded in the total in Section 1.]

Gaza Strip:

- **3 January:** A 25 year-old Fatah member was killed by unknown armed men outside his home in Beit Lahia. Another five Palestinians were injured when armed clashes erupted between Fatah members and the Hamas-dominated ESF.
- **3 January:** A Hamas member and his sister were injured when a bomb he was handling detonated prematurely in his house in Gaza City.
- **3 January:** A 14 year-old Palestinian boy was found dead at Al Moghraga area north of Al Bureij Camp. The circumstances surrounding this incident remain unclear.
- **3 January:** Three PA Preventative Security personnel were killed during armed clashes between Fatah members and the ESF in Khan Younis.
- **3 January:** A PA Preventive Security Officer was injured and abducted by unknown gunmen in Khan Younis.
- 3 January: A female bystander was killed and three others injured during armed clashes between Fatah members and the ESF in Jabalia refugee camp.
- 4 January: A 25 year-old Hamas member died of wounds sustained when an explosive device he was handling detonated prematurely on 3 January in Gaza City.
- **4 January:** Five Palestinians were injured in armed clashes in Al Maghazi and Deir El-Balah camps between Fatah and Hamas supporters.
- **4 January:** A 26 year-old member of the ESF was killed and two others injured during an exchange of gunfire between the ESF and PA Preventive Security Forces in Jabalia.
- 4 and 5 January: Six PA Preventative Security officers, aged 18, 22, 28 (2), 45 and 47 years, were killed and 90 others injured in armed clashes between the ESF and Fatah groups in Jabalia.
- **5 January:** Two Hamas members were seriously injured when a group of armed men opened fire and threw a hand grenade in the Al Sabra area in Gaza City.
- 5 January: A 46 year-old official of a local Islamic group was killed and another injured when unknown gunmen opened fire, while they were driving a car on Salah Ed-Din road at Al Maghazi Junction.
- **5 January:** Three Palestinians were injured during armed clashes between a local family and ESF members in Gaza City.
- 6 January: A 25 year-old Hamas member died of wounds sustained when an explosive device he was handling detonated prematurely on 29 December in the Al Zaitoun area in Gaza City.
- **6 January:** Three members of the same family, aged 30 (2) and 55 years, were killed and five others were injured in an armed family feud.
- **7 January:** A Palestinian was injured when a gunman belonging to a large Gaza family opened fire in the Al Sabra area of Gaza City.
- 7 January: A Palestinian man was injured when unknown gunmen opened in Al Nuseirat Camp.
- **9 January:** A member of the ESF was injured in an exchange of fire between members of Hamas and Fatah in Beit Lahia.

• **9 January:** A member of the PA 'Force 17' was injured during armed clashes between the ESF and PA Force 17 south of the President's Office in Gaza City.

West Bank:

- **6 January:** Masked men shot and injured a 46 year-old lecturer from An Najah University in Nablus city (Nablus).
- 6 January: Masked men physically assaulted and injured a 20 year-old man in Nablus city (Nablus).
- **6 January**: In Ramallah city (Ramallah), masked gunmen kidnapped the Deputy Minister of Interior. He was shot by a live bullet to his leg and released after a few hours.

Other incidents (not involving casualties):

- 3 January: Masked men opened fire at the Ministry of Religious Affairs building in Tulkarm (Tulkarm). No injuries were reported.
- 4 January: Masked men set fire to the vehicle of the Minister of Prisoners' Affairs in Jenin city (Jenin).
- **5 January:** Masked men set fire to the Islamic Club and the Teachers' Committee building in Jenin city (Jenin).
- 4 January: Unknown gunmen fired a RPG close to the home of PA Foreign Minster in Gaza City. No injuries were reported.
- **6 January:** A local family abducted five ESF members. Members of the ESF retaliated by abducting six members of the family. All were later released.
- 6 January: Masked men kidnapped the Deputy Mayor of Nablus (Nablus). He was released unharmed on 8 January.
- **8 January:** Gunmen shot at 13 shops and installations belonging to Hamas affiliated members in Ramallah city (Ramallah). One clothes shop was also set on fire.
- **8 January:** In Ramallah city (Ramallah) unknown gunmen shot at the office of Dr. Salam Fayyad, the former minister of Finance.
- **8 January**: During a kidnapping attempt, masked gunmen shot at the acting mayor of Al Bireh municipality while driving in Ramallah (Ramallah). No injuries were reported.
- **9 January:** Masked men shot and injured a 21 year-old Palestinian man (affiliated with Hamas) in Birqin village (Jenin).

3. Shelter and Property

- 3 January: The Israeli High Court of Justice issued an eviction order for residents of the Al Hadidiya village in the Jordan Valley. The court ruled that the population of the village (about 80 people) constituted a threat to the settler's security in the area (Roi settlement), and therefore should be evicted by 10 February 2007. No alternative place was suggested by the court.
- 6 9 January: For three days IDF soldiers occupied a house in Al 'Arrub camp (Hebron). The six members of the family were locked into one room whilst the IDF occupied the rest of the house. Extensive damage to the house was reported.

4. Natural Resources

Land levelling/Requisitions/Tree Uprooting²

Nablus Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Since 17 September, land levelling continues for a road barrier installed north of Road 505, east of Zaatara checkpoint.
- Since 15 June, land levelling continues north of Shave Shomeron settlement (west of Nablus) to install a fence.

Jenin Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Tubas Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Tulkarm Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

 Land levelling continues around Avnei Khefets and Enav settlements for the construction of a new fence.

Qalqiliya Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction: land levelling and construction work continue near Immatin village, between 'Azzun and Kafr Thulth and between Azzun and Kafr Lagif.
- Since 12 November land levelling and the installation of a fence by the IDF continues south of Ázzun Átma.

Salfit Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

 Barrier construction: Israeli contractors continue levelling land and construction works north of Salfit City, Iskaka and Deir Istiya villages and south of Marda and Kifl Haris villages around Ariel settlement.

Ramallah / Al Bireh Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
 - Construction continues between Kharbatha al Misbah and Bil'in and is in the final stages in the section between Beit 'Ur al Fauqa and At Tira villages.
 - The last section of the Barrier in Beit Sira village is complete between Beit Sira and Makkabim settlement. A 400-metre section between the village and Beit Nuba is under construction and a gate is being installed.
 - Following a decision by the Israeli High Court approving a new route of the Barrier in 'Abud, construction resumed parallel to bypass Road 465, as well as between 'Abud and Ofarim and Beit Arye settlements.
 - Construction continues near Umm Safa, parallel to bypass Road 465, to create a buffer zone around Ateret settlement. The land was earlier requisitioned by the IDF and belongs to Palestinians from Atara and Umm Safa villages.

Jerusalem Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
 - Construction continues along the projected route in the Jerusalem governorate. Exceptions to this are northeast of Al 'Eizariya towards Ma'ale Adummim settlement. Construction continues along 3 km stretch of the Barrier south of Ma'ale Adummim and Kedar but has stopped since 3 March pending a court case.
 - Construction near Ar Ram checkpoint between Dahiyat Al Bareed and Atarot is ongoing. Detours through the neighbourhoods of Ar Ram and Dahiyat Al Bareed continue and changes are experienced on a daily basis. The previous gate in the area is now sealed off by an iron wall. Vehicles are currently using a dirt road a few metres beyond the gate to move. Construction of the Barrier in this area is progressing rapidly.
- Construction of a road barrier continues on Road 1, east of Az Za'ayyem.
 Palestinians with Jerusalem ID cards driving to Jerusalem, now have to drive south to Ma'ale Adummim and then return through Az Za'ayyem checkpoint.
- Construction of an Israeli police station in E1 continues.
- The road between Anata and Al 'Eizariya is under construction (Road 70).
 Another road (Road 80) is planned that will link Abu Dis to Road 1 east of the planned Barrier around Ma'ale Adummim. The road will be open for Palestinians only.

Jericho Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Bethlehem Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
 - Construction continues next to Al Khadr Boys School along the eastern side of Road 60 adjacent to the school playground.
 - Land levelling continues in the section of Road 60 between the Palestinian village of Al Khadr and Al Nashshash (southern entrance of the city of Bethlehem).
 - Land levelling continues in the vicinity of the settlement of Har Gilo continues.
 - Land levelling continues in the vicinity of the settlement of Efrat, near Artas village, continues.
- Land levelling and digging for the construction of the tunnel near Al Khadr village has accelerated. Levelling is also taking place along the western side of Road 60.
- Paving continues on the side of Tunnels checkpoint to expand the site. The site has been expanded with additional infrastructure. Land leveling has taken place on both sides of the junction at Road 60 leading to Beit Jala.
- Work continues on the road leading to the Talita Khoumy School. A onemetre high road barrier was installed and land levelling has continued on both sides of the road.
- Land levelling for the construction of the new terminal next to Al Jab'a checkpoint continues.
- Construction work at Nu'man terminal is ongoing.

Hebron Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction: Construction continues west of Eshkolot settlement.
- Land leveling including paving continues west of the checkpoint of Tarqumiya for a new commercial checkpoint.
- Construction of the agricultural terminal at Meitar checkpoint is ongoing.
- Paving continues at the Beit Yatir checkpoint close to the Palestinian hamlet of Imneizil. An observation tower and two electronic gates were installed. The terminal is almost completed.

Gaza Strip:

No incidents to report.

5. Access and Movement for Civilians

a) Curfew

No incidents to report.

b) Access to education

8 – 9 January: The IDF and Israeli Police escorted Palestinian students from Tuba to their elementary school in At Tuwani, south Hebron Governorate with an average delay of half an hour on the two afternoons. The escort has been provided since 2004 to protect the students from attacks by Israeli settlers from the Ma'on settlement.

c) Access to employment

There is currently no communication between Israeli and Palestinian authorities (DCOs) and Palestinian workers and traders are applying directly to the Israeli authorities for permits to enter East Jerusalem and Israel.

The eligibility criteria for permits are similar for both workers and traders; over 35 years old, married with children and with no security file. The age restriction has been relaxed for permits to the Atarot Industrial Zone to over 21 years old.

d) Closures/movement restrictions

Nablus Governorate:

9 January: The IDF closed Huwwara checkpoint for one hour after a bomb was found near the checkpoint.

Ongoing incidents:

- The IDF continues to close the road connecting Qaryut village with Road 60 and the Mekorot water filling point with a road block. The closure separates three villages (Talfit, Jalud and Qaryut) from their source of water.
- The IDF continues to close Shave Shomeron checkpoint for all vehicles, including UN and humanitarian organisations.

Jenin Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

Since 30 August, the IDF have allowed 40 commercial trucks (with less than a
two tonnes freight load) to transport food products to Barta'a enclave. A list with
the plate numbers of the trucks is present at the checkpoint. Other materials
continue to require prior coordination.

Tubas Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Tulkarm Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

 The IDF continues to prevent Palestinians with Israeli IDs from entering Palestinian areas unless they have relatives living in Tulkarm.

Qalqiliya Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- The main entrance to 'Izbat at Tabib village continues to be closed by the IDF with an earth mound.
- The IDF continues to close the dirt roads connecting Kafr Qaddum with Hajja, Kur and Beit Lid villages.

Salfit Governorates:

Ongoing incidents:

- The IDF continues to close the gate at the northern entrance of Kafr ad Dik.
- The agricultural gates in the Barrier continue to be closed by the IDF near Masha and Az Zawiya preventing farmers from accessing their land.

Ramallah / Al Bireh Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Bethlehem Governorate:

4 January: According to Israeli sources, 7,900 permits were issued for Christian Palestinians to access religious sites in Jerusalem and Israel for the Christmas holidays. The permit is for one-month between 20 December 2006 and 20 January 2007 and allows access 24 hours a day. Children under 16 years do not require a permit.

Hebron Governorate:

8 January: IDF soldiers and Israeli settlers from Beit Hadassah H2/Hebron (Hebron), prevented Palestinians accompanied by a team from B'Tselem from walking on Al Shuhada Street, a major thoroughfare in Hebron, despite a court ruling issued on 29 December 2006 allowing Palestinian pedestrians access to the street.

Jerusalem Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Jericho Governorate/Jordan Valley:

9 January: Bisan checkpoint, north of Tubas opened for Palestinian merchants from the Jordan Valley and Jericho to export their agricultural produce into Israel via Bisan using the back-to-back system. Palestinians from the West Bank in possession of businessman cards, in addition to an Israeli permit, are allowed through this checkpoint into Israel. Palestinians working for international organisations continue to be prohibited from using Bisan checkpoint.

During the reporting period: Daily delays were reported at Tayasir checkpoint (Tubas). Delays up to one hour were experienced during morning and evening rush hours. Ongoing incidents:

On 14 September the IDF announced that only Palestinians with Jericho residency and Jerusalem ID holders would be able to exit via the Jericho DCO

checkpoint, forcing all other travellers to either get a permit issued by Israeli authorities or travel on the Al Mu'arrajat old road to reach the rest of the West Bank

Gaza Strip

During the reporting period:

- Karni crossing was open for six days (Karni is scheduled to be closed on Saturdays).
- Rafah Passengers' terminal was open for six days. The crossing was closed on
 3 January and on 9 January it was open for arrivals only.
- Erez crossing was partially open for the movement of diplomats, international humanitarian workers, critical medical cases and Palestinian 'senior' traders. (Non-diplomats require prior coordination with the IDF which is being decided on a case-by-case basis). The crossing continues to be closed for Palestinian workers (since 12 March 2006). On 7 January between 7:30am and 4:00pm the crossing was closed during a strike by Israeli Border Police
- Nahal Oz energy pipelines were open for six days (the pipelines are scheduled to be closed on Saturdays).
- Sufa crossing was open for six days (Sufa is scheduled to be closed on Saturdays).
- Kerem Shalom crossing was closed all week.
- Gaza fishermen are permitted to fish up to six nautical miles off the coastline.

Ongoing incidents:

- The IDF declared the eastern part of Beit Hanoun (approximately one km along the security fence east of Beit Hanoun) a closed military area.
- The IDF announced that Palestinians should keep a distance of at least 150 metres from the perimeter fence along the eastern and northern borders of the Gaza Strip.
- The IDF declared parts of the northern Gaza Strip a "no-go" or enlarged buffer zone on 28 December 2005. Entry into the area is only possible with prior permission from the IDF.

Method and Sources

The information used to compile these Briefing Notes comes from a range of sources with a field presence in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip. The accuracy of the reported information is ensured through the corroboration of reports by two additional sources. Typically, the OCHA Field Coordination Unit (FCU) receives an initial incident report from a source, which is verified through visits to the incident site in addition to further corroboration with a third source, such as an NGO. In addition, OCHA FCU collects military orders as documentary evidence and provides information on incidents witnessed in person.
