EMERGENCY UPDATE - BURUNDI REFUGEE INFLUX

1-7 July 2015

HIGHLIGHTS

Operational Context

- After peaking last week before Burundi's parliamentary elections, the rate of new arrivals has since gone down. Refugees have reported a significant increase in checkpoints and blockades by Imbonerakure. UNHCR remains on high alert for a possible increase, depending on whether the presidential elections are scheduled to take place 15 July, despite recommendations by regional leaders to postpone the elections until the end of the month.
- The ruling party, the CNDD FDD, has won the parliamentary election, which was boycotted by the main opposition parties.

UPDATE ON ACHIEVEMENTS

Education

- The total number of students enrolled in the orientation classes are:
 - 7.809 students
 - Primary Level: 5,960 (2,859 girls)
 - Secondary level: 1,849 (692 girls)
- Notebooks, pencils, pens, and book bags were distributed to students attending orientation classes. About 15,000 notebooks, 917 pens, and 530 school bags have been distributed thus far.
- 48 Burundian and 37 Rwandan teachers hired thus far; 11 additional teachers needed.
- Curriculum will include 4 languages, math, social science, and physical education.





Protection

Child protection (CP) & Sexual and Gender Based Violence (SGBV) **Achievements and Impact**

- Thus far UNHCR, UNICEF and Plan International have identified 1,537 unaccompanied and separated children (UASC) (377 separated children and 1,160 unaccompanied children). Out of the UASC identified so far, 281 have been reunified with their parents/customary caregivers or relatives.
- Thus far **35** SGBV cases (the majority being domestic violence and denial of resources) have been identified and assisted with response services by different actors through referral pathways established by UNHCR.



Achievements and Impact


- During the reporting week, over 1,339 refugee patients were treated at Mahama camp health center and over 1,322 were treated at Bugesera and Nyanze reception centers, respectively, with the support of ARC, AHA and UNHCR.
- Supported by the Ministry of Health, 135 HIV patients have received free access to Anti-Retroviral Therapy (ART) in Mahama.
- 12 mothers in Mahama gave birth this week. All were provided with necessary skilled obstetrics care, in collaboration with UNHCR and ARC, and received dignity kits donated by UNFPA.



Water and Sanitation

Achievements and Impact (in Mahama camp)

• In addition to water trucking, surface treatment has begun in Mahama camp to help resolve the water situation. Once the first phase is completed, it is expected that 120m³ of water will be provided per day, which represents 25% of the daily requirements. Although this is a temporary attempt to find water, another more intense effort at digging boreholes will commence at the end of the week, following the hydrogeology surveys on the camp site. More permanent solutions are being explored.


