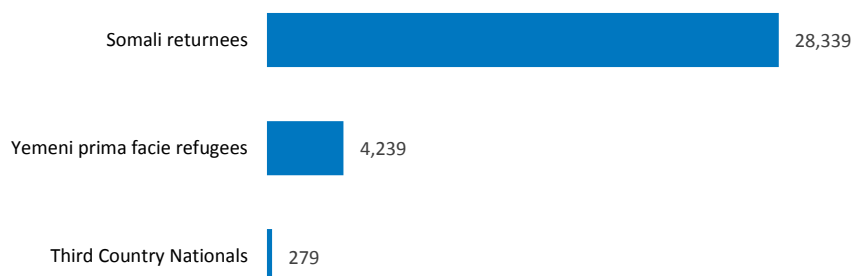

### HIGHLIGHTS

- During the reporting period, there have been five boat arrivals from Yemen to Somalia,
- In Puntland three boats (10 Yemeni, 79 Somali and 1 Ethiopian) carrying a total of 90 individuals. Of the new arrivals, 72 went to the Bossaso reception center and were registered by UNHCR in direct collaboration with local authorities and partners.
- In Somaliland two boat (50 Yemeni, 3 Somali and 1 Djiboutian) carrying a total of 54 individuals. Of the new arrivals, 54 went to the reception center and were registered by UNHCR in direct collaboration with local authorities and partners.

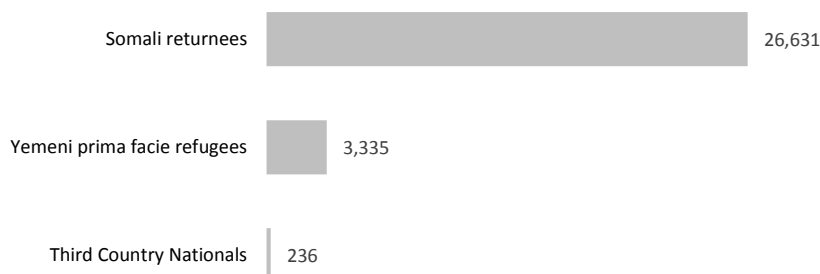
#### Population of concern

#### 2015 Population of concern

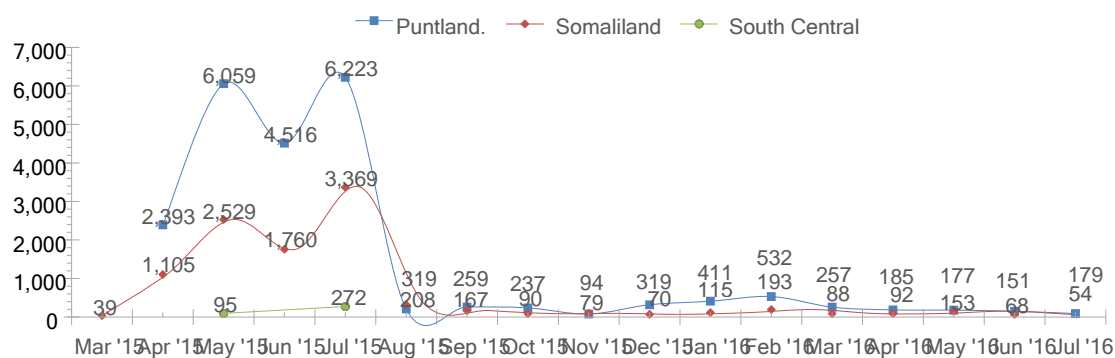
A total of **30,202** people of concern in 2015

# UPDATE ON ACHIEVEMENTS

---

## Operational Context

### SOMALILAND

- During the month of July, only two boats arrived from Yemen to Berbera, with a total of 54 new arrivals.

### PUNTLAND

- During the reporting period, arrivals from Yemen have drastically decreased. Despite the low number of arrivals, 90 individuals in second part of July, the situation in Yemen remains unpredictable and increases in arrivals are possible.

## Achievements

### Protection

---

#### SOMALILAND

- On 21 July, one boat carrying a total of 39 individuals of 35 Yemenis, 3 Somalis and 1 Djiboutian arrived at Berbera. Among the 39 new arrivals, six were returning to Berbera for the second time. On 23 July, one boat carrying a total of 15 Yemenis arrived in Berbera.
- No cases of armed/physical violence or SGBV during their journey was reported. All new arrivals were documented in good health condition, and were provided with food, water and accommodation at the reception centre.
- CCBRS carried out a vulnerability assessment for the provision of onward transportation allowance (OTA) by IOM.

#### PUNTLAND

- During the reporting period, three boats carrying 90 individuals of 79 Somalis, 10 Yemeni and 1 Ethiopian arrived in Bossaso.
- The new arrivals were provided with refreshments by DRC. Transport from the port to the Reception Centre was provided by IOM. Biometric registration for all arrivals was carried out by UNHCR and Refugee certificates co-signed by UNHCR and Ministry of Interior (MoI) were provided to nine refugees.
- Emergency cash and NFIs assistance to new arrival refugees upon registration was processed by UNHCR.

### Health

---

#### SOMALILAND

- No medical assistance was required by the new arrivals.

#### PUNTLAND

- Yemeni refugees continue to receive medical assistance, through UNHCR's implementing partner Gruppo per le Relazioni Transculturali (GRT), during biometric registration, in case of a medical emergency. In total 7 households of 15 individuals received medical assistance.

## Food Security and Nutrition

---

### SOMALILAND

- DRC with the collaboration of WFP provided meals to the new arrivals.

### PUNTLAND

- The WFP's food support programme came to an end in June. Religious leaders stepped in to provide dry foods, cash for vegetables and meat at the center from 1 July through the Ministry of Interior. There is need for provision of hot meals as the funds raised by the host community cannot last for three months.
- Wages for the incentive staff at the Centre kitchen is also a gap.



## Water and Sanitation

---

### PUNTLAND

- Drinking water and sanitation was provided at the Reception Centre by UNHCR through the MoI.
- Water consumption and provision depends on the number of arrivals, so far 2 trucks per week have been recorded during summer time.



## Shelter and NFIs

---

### SOMALILAND

- Among the 54 new arrivals, 22 persons were provided with CRI.



## Logistics

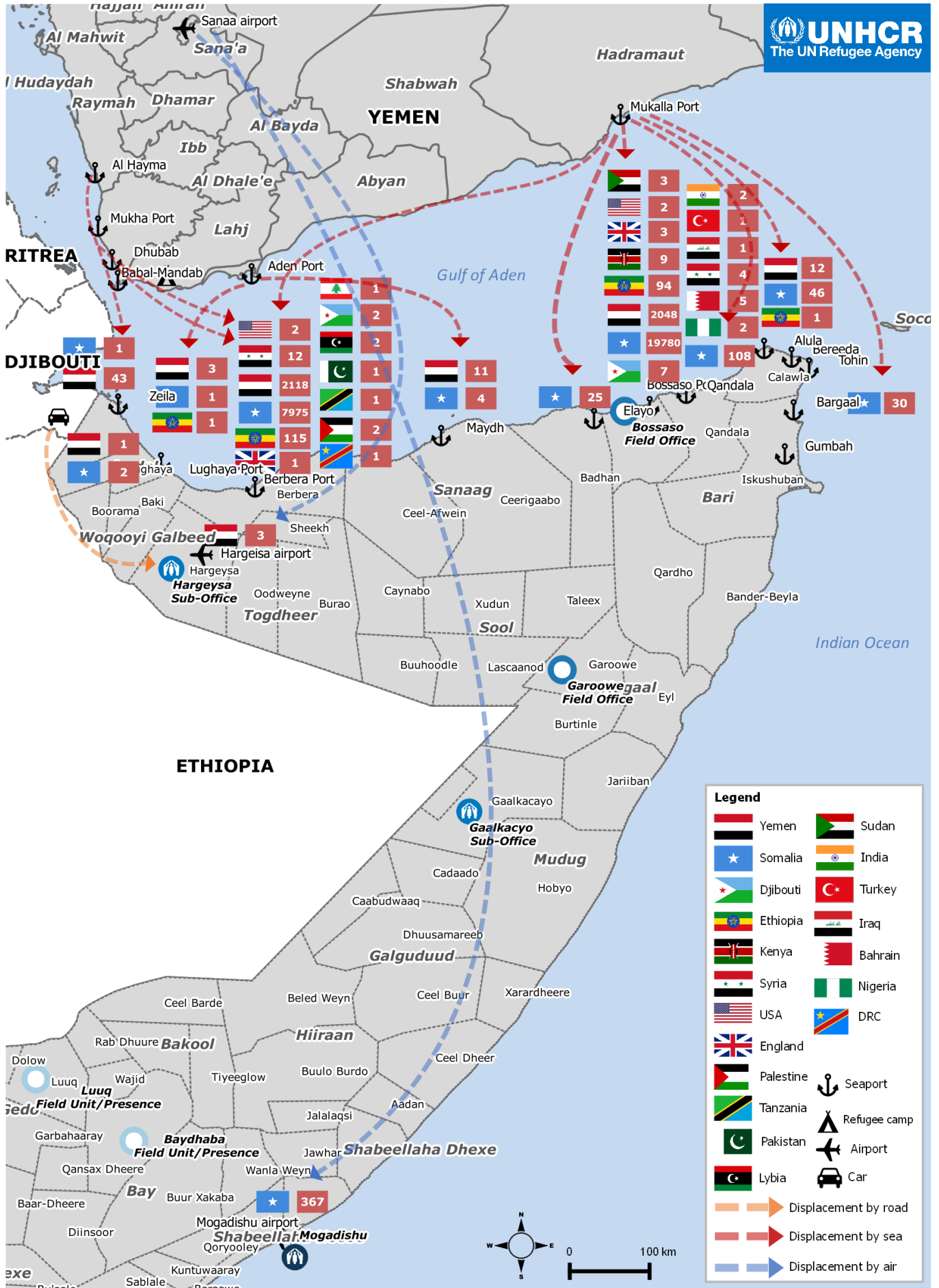

### SOMALILAND

- Among the 54 new arrivals, 12 individuals were provided with OTA by IOM.

### PUNTLAND

- During the reporting period, 38 Somali returnees from South Central were provided with OTA to enable them to reach their place of origin: 17 individuals to Mogadishu, 10 to Belweyn, 6 to Kismayo and 5 to Jawhar.
- The emergency cash assistance to the new arrivals refugees was provided by UNHCR upon registration.

## FINANCIAL INFORMATION

The Somalia Response Plan for Yemen Crisis (April – December 2015) was released on 4 June and shared with donors, governments and partners. 11 UN agencies and NGOs participate in the inter-agency response.
