

### LOCALIZATION OF CONFLICT INCIDENTS

<u>Note:</u> The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the map above.

In Ad Daqahliyah, 7 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Ad Daqahlyah, Al ManSurah.

In Al Buhayrah, 8 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Abu Ḥummuṣ, Al Buḥayrah, Damanhur, 'Izbat Abu Ḥamad.

In Al Fayyum, 15 incidents killing 5 people were reported. The following location was affected: Al Fayyum.

In **Al Gharbiyah**, **6** incidents killing **1** person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Al Gharbyah**, **As Santah**, **tanta**.

In Al Iskandariyah, 23 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Al Wardiyan, Al Ḥarah, Alexandria, Ar Raml, Burj al-Arab, Mna' al BaSal, Sidi Beshr, Sidi Jabir.

In Al Isma`iliyah, 7 incidents killing 3 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Al Qantarah, Ismailia, Ismailia.

In Al Jizah, 40 incidents killing 13 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Al Agouza, Al Haram, Al Jzah, Al Munirah, Ard El Lewa, Ash Shurafa, At talibyah, Atfh, Boulaq Ad Dakrour, FaySal, Kirdasah, Madnat as Sadis min Uktubar, Mohandiseen, Oula, Saqiyet Mekki, turá.

In Al Minufiyah, 4 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Al Minufyah, Shibn al Kawm.

In Al Minya, 13 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Al Matahirah al Qiblyah, Al Matahrah al Baḥaryah, Al Minya, Jabal at tayr, Minya, Samalut.

In Al Qahirah, 66 incidents killing 14 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Al Azbakeyah, Al Maadi, Al Marj, Al Mataryah, Al Qahirah al Jaddah, As Sayyidah Zaynab, Az Zamalik, Bulaq Abu el Ela, Cairo, El-Abaseya, Halwan, MiSr al Qadmah, Nasr City, QaSr an NI, Shubra, 'Ayn Shams.

In Al Qalyubiyah, 13 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Abu Zabal Prison, Abu Za'bal, Al Khankah, Al Qalyubyah, Banha, Shubra al Khaymah.

In Al Uasur, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: Luxor.

In Al Wadi al Jadid, 1 incident killing 25 people was reported. The following location was affected: Farafra Oasis.

In **As Suways**, 6 incidents killing 11 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ain Sokhna, Suez, Wad Umm Jarf, 'Ataqah**.

In **Ash Sharqiyah**, **7** incidents killing **0** people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ash Sharqyah**, **Minya** al Qamħ.

In Asyut, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: Asyut.

In Bani Suwayf, 5 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: Ban Suwayf.

In Bur Sa`id, 2 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following location was affected: Port Said.

In Dumyat, 4 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following location was affected: Damietta.

# EGYPT, THIRD QUARTER 2014: UPDATE ON INCIDENTS ACCORDING TO THE ARMED CONFLICT LOCATION & EVENT DATA PROJECT (ACLED) COMPILED BY ACCORD, 3 NOVEMBER 2015

In Janub Sina', 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Janub Sna'.

In Kafr ash Shaykh, 4 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Kafr ash Shaykh.

In Matrouh, 2 incidents killing 8 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Markaz Al Alamein, Marsá Matruh.

In Qina, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Qina.

In Shamal Sina', 92 incidents killing 275 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Al Wifaq, Al 'Arsh, An Nusranyah, El Shalaq, Rafaḩ, Shamal Sina', Shamal Sna', Sheikh Zuweiyid, Wad al Jurur, Ḥaw az Zawarah.

In Suhaj, 3 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following location was affected: Suhaj.

### **METHODOLOGY**

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location and Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Egypt being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type. Based on these data, the Austrian Center for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents.
