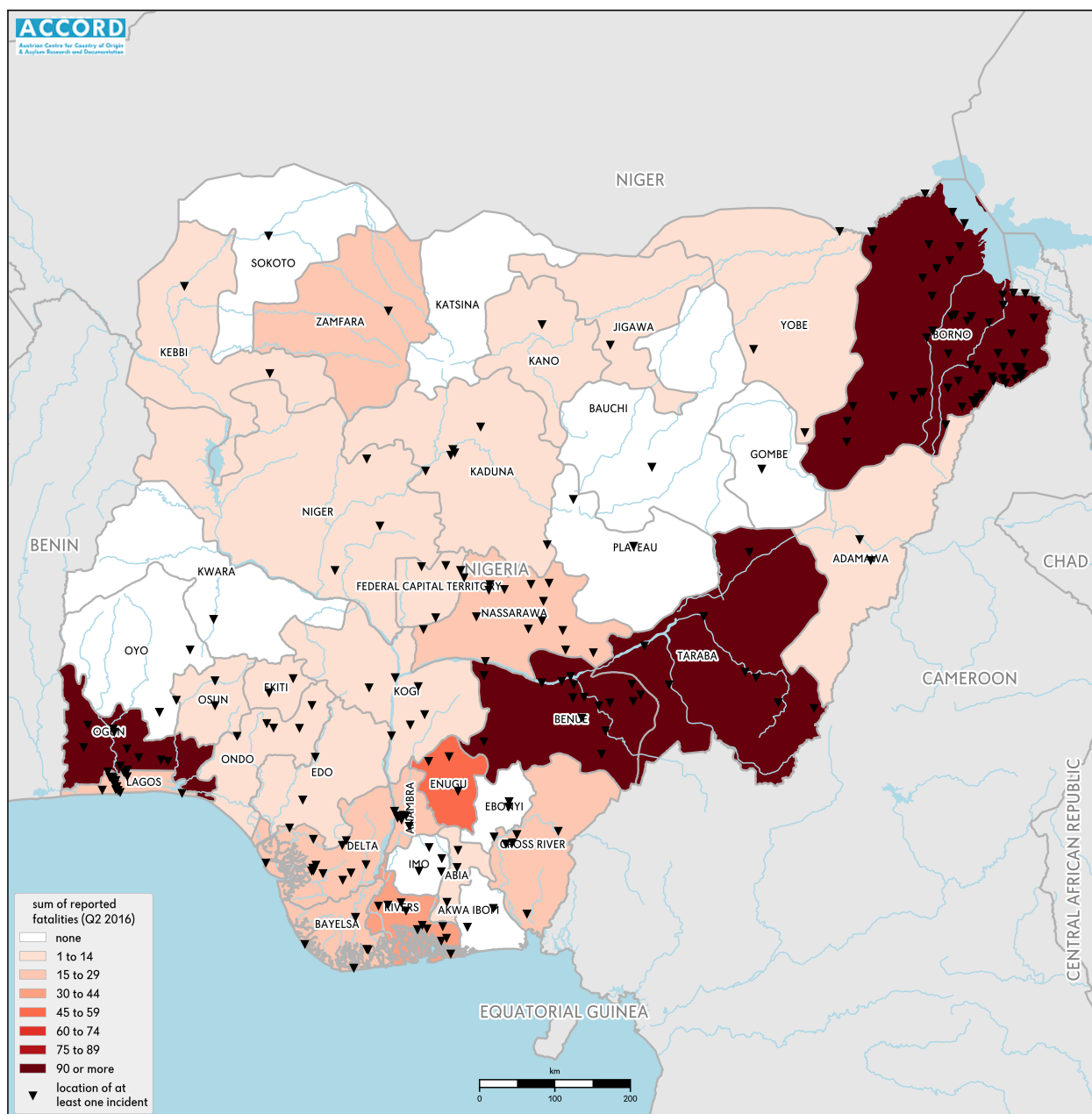


NIGERIA, SECOND QUARTER 2016:

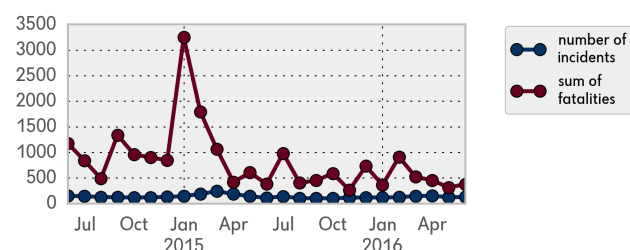

LOCALIZATION OF CONFLICT INCIDENTS

Note: The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the map above.

In **Abia**, 8 incidents killing 10 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Aba, Nbalano, Umuahia**.

In **Adamawa**, 2 incidents killing 8 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Kwo, Yola**.

In **Akwa Ibom**, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ikot Ibritam, Uyo**.

In **Anambra**, 8 incidents killing 17 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Atani, Ikenga-Ogidi, Nkpor, Nnewi, Obosi, Onitsha**.

In **Bauchi**, 4 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Bauchi**.

In **Bayelsa**, 11 incidents killing 23 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Bassambiri, Brass, Frupa, Nembe, Yenagoo**.

In **Benue**, 28 incidents killing 93 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Abinsi, Adikpo, Agasha, Gbajimba, Gboko, Gburuku, Katsina Ala, Makurdi, Obangedde, Okpoga, Tseantyo, Tseaondo, Ugba, Uzaar, Wannune, Zaki Biam**.

In **Borno**, 101 incidents killing 530 people were reported. In **Cross River**, 11 incidents killing 15 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Calabar, Ikom, Inyima, Nkpani, Ugep**.

In **Delta**, 27 incidents killing 28 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Abraka, Aladja Omia, Asaba, Effurun, Enwhe, Escravos, Ibrede, Jerhe, Koko, Obiaruku Quarters, Ogbe-Ijoh, Ole, Otor Udu, Warri**.

In **Ebonyi**, 5 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Abakaliki, Afikpo, Nkwagu**.

In **Edo**, 7 incidents killing 3 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Agenebode, Benin City, Sobe**.

In **Ekiti**, 5 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ado-Ekiti, Ikole**.

In **Enugu**, 8 incidents killing 48 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Enugu, Nsukka, Ukpabi-Nimbo**.

In **Federal Capital Territory**, 27 incidents killing 4 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Abuja, Gurfata, Kubwa, Zagabutu**.

In **Gombe**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Gombe**.

In **Imo**, 6 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Dikenafai, Okpofe, Owerri, Umueze**.

In **Jigawa**, 1 incident killing 1 person was reported. The following location was affected: **Dutse**.

In **Kaduna**, 7 incidents killing 6 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Chikun, Fadan Karshe, Igabi, Kaduna, Kakuri, Kamaza**.

In **Kano**, 2 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following location was affected: **Kano**.

In **Kebbi**, 2 incidents killing 7 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Birnin Kebbi, Zuru**.

In **Kogi**, 7 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Dekina, Ejule, Gwolawo, Lokoja, Osara**.

In **Kwara**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Illorin**.

In **Lagos**, 28 incidents killing 25 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Agege, Alagbado-Ile, Alimosho, Idi Araba, Igbo-Lomi, Ijora, Ikeja, Ikorodu, Ishawo, Lagos, Maryland, Mushin, Ojo, Victoria Island, Yaba**.

In **Nassarawa**, 17 incidents killing 23 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Akwanga, Awe, Doma, Karu, Keana, Keffi, Kokouna, Lafia, Loko, Nassarawa, Nassarawan Eggon, Obi, Toto, Tudun Wada, Wamba**.

In **Niger**, 4 incidents killing 4 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Bida, Minna, Pan Dongari**.

In **Ogun**, 12 incidents killing 97 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Abeokuta, Aiyetoro, Akomoje, Ibafo, Ijebu-Ode, Ilewo, Imushin, Ogigo, Owode, Shagamu**.

In **Ondo**, 4 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Akunba, Akure, Ilado, Owo**.

In **Osun**, 5 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ife-Ife, Ondo, Oshogbo**.

In **Oyo**, 9 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ibadan, Lagun, Ogbomosho**.

In **Plateau**, 6 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Jos, Kwal**.

In **Rivers**, 17 incidents killing 40 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Afam, Ahoada, Bomu, Bori, Elele, Isiokpo, Ngo, Ogali, Okobe, Port Harcourt, Rumuwaji.**

In **Sokoto**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Sokoto.**

In **Taraba**, 10 incidents killing 127 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Balasa, Bali, Dobi, Donga, Gassol, Ibi, Maisuma, Serti.**

In **Yobe**, 4 incidents killing 11 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Gulani, Kanamma, Potiskum.**

In **Zamfara**, 2 incidents killing 20 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Gusau.**

METHODOLOGY

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Nigeria being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type. Based on these data, the Austrian Centre for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battle, headquarters or base established, non-violent strategic activities, riots/protests, violence against civilians, non-violent transfer of territory, remote violence. For details on these categories, please see

Most of the data collected by ACLED is gathered based on publicly available, secondary reports. It may therefore underestimate the volume of events. Fatality data particularly is vulnerable to bias and inaccurate reporting, and ACLED uses the most conservative estimate available. Furthermore, event data may be revised or complemented in future updates. The lack of information on an event in this report does not permit the inference that it did not take place. The boundaries and names displayed do not imply endorsement or acceptance by the Austrian Red Cross.
