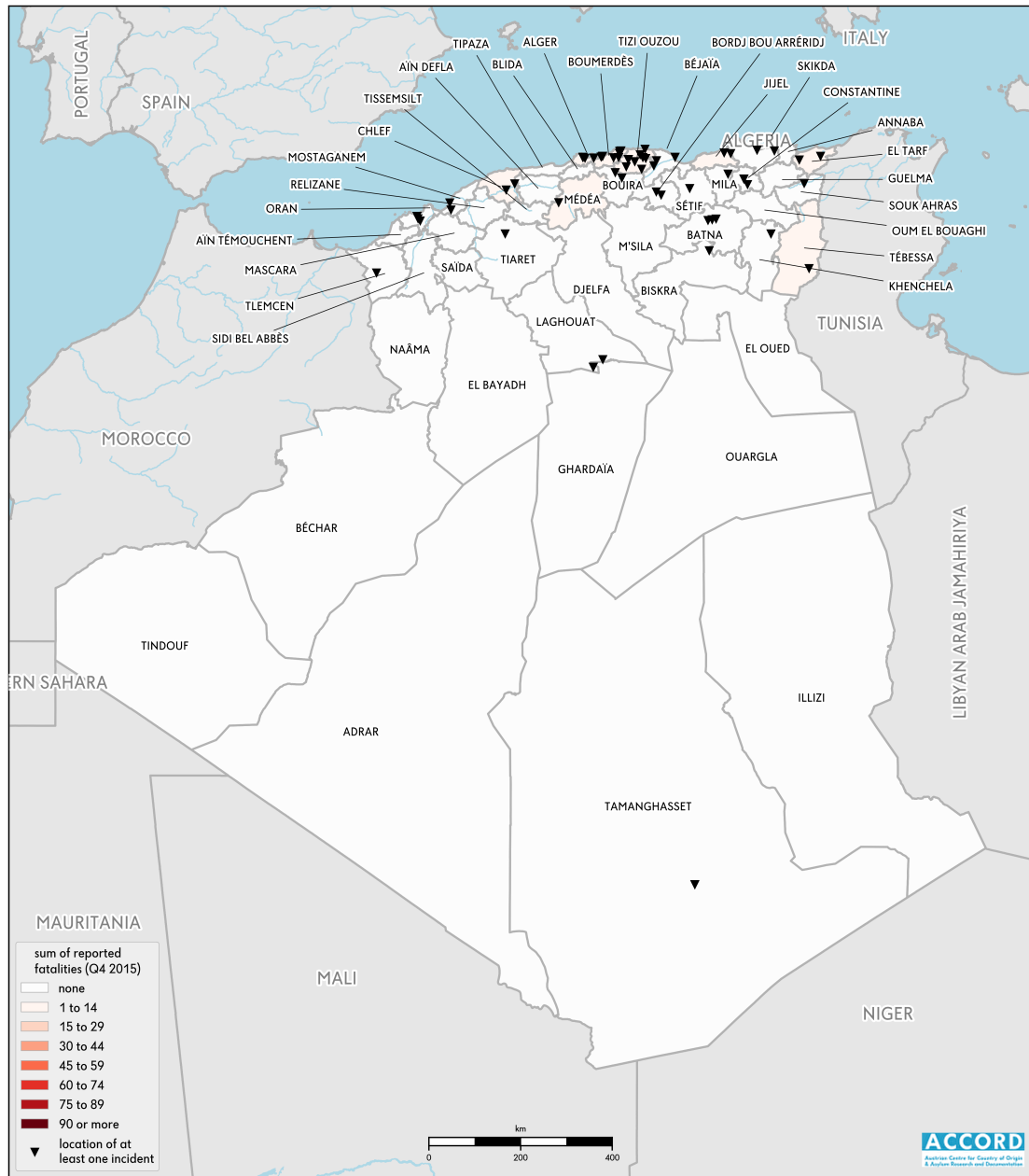


ALGERIA, FOURTH QUARTER 2015:

compiled by ACCORD, 4 February 2016



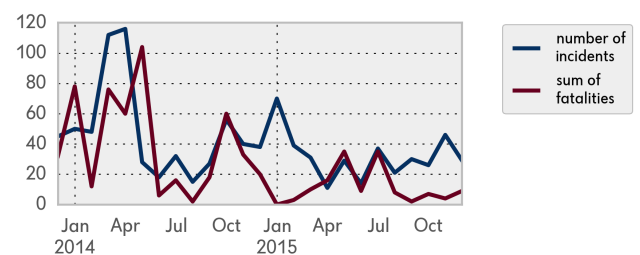

LOCALIZATION OF CONFLICT INCIDENTS

Note: The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the map above.

In **Alger**, 13 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Algiers, Bir Mourad Rais, Kouba, Rouiba.**

In **Batna**, 4 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Merouana, Oued El Ma, Taxlent.**

In **Biskra**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Djemorah.**

In **Bordj Bou Arréridj**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Bordj Bou Arréridj, Medjana.**

In **Bouira**, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Bouira, Djebahia.**

In **Boumerdès**, 12 incidents killing 3 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Baghlia, Ben Choud, Bordj Menaiel, Boumerdes, Corso Tahtani, Naciria, Sidi Daoud.**

In **Béjaïa**, 5 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Adekar, Bejaia, Chemini.**

In **Chlef**, 2 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Beni Rached, Chlef.**

In **Constantine**, 9 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Constantine, El Khroub.**

In **El Tarf**, 2 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Besbes, El Tarf.**

In **Jijel**, 2 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Douar Ouled Arbi, Ras Ameharane.**

In **Khenchela**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Tazougart.**

In **Laghouat**, 5 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Hassi Bouzbaier, Hassi RMel.**

In **Mila**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Mila.**

In **Mostaganem**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Douar el Bekhaitia, Mostaganem.**

In **Médéa**, 1 incident killing 1 person was reported. The following location was affected: **Ouled Hellal.**

In **Oran**, 8 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **El Kerma, Es Senia, Oran**.

In **Skikda**, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ben Azzouz, Skikda**.

In **Souk Ahras**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Souk Ahras**.

In **Sétif**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Setif**.

In **Tamanghasset**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Tamanrasset**.

In **Tiaret**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Tiaret**.

In **Tizi Ouzou**, 15 incidents killing 9 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Abi Youcef, Aghribs, Azazga, Azeffoun, Hasnaoua, Maatka, Tizi Ouzou, Tizi Rached, Yakouren**.

In **Tlemcen**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Beni Snous**.

In **Tébessa**, 1 incident killing 1 person was reported. The following location was affected: **Bir El-Ater**.

METHODOLOGY

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Algeria being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type. Based on these data, the Austrian Centre for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battle, headquarters or base established, non-violent strategic activities, riots/protests, violence against civilians, non-violent transfer of territory, remote violence. For details on these categories, please see

Most of the data collected by ACLED is gathered based on publicly available, secondary reports. It may therefore underestimate the volume of events. Fatality data particularly is vulnerable to bias and inaccurate reporting, and ACLED uses the most conservative estimate available. Furthermore, event data may be revised or complemented in future updates. The lack of information on an event in this report does not permit the inference that it did not take place. The boundaries and names displayed do not imply endorsement or acceptance by the Austrian Red Cross.
