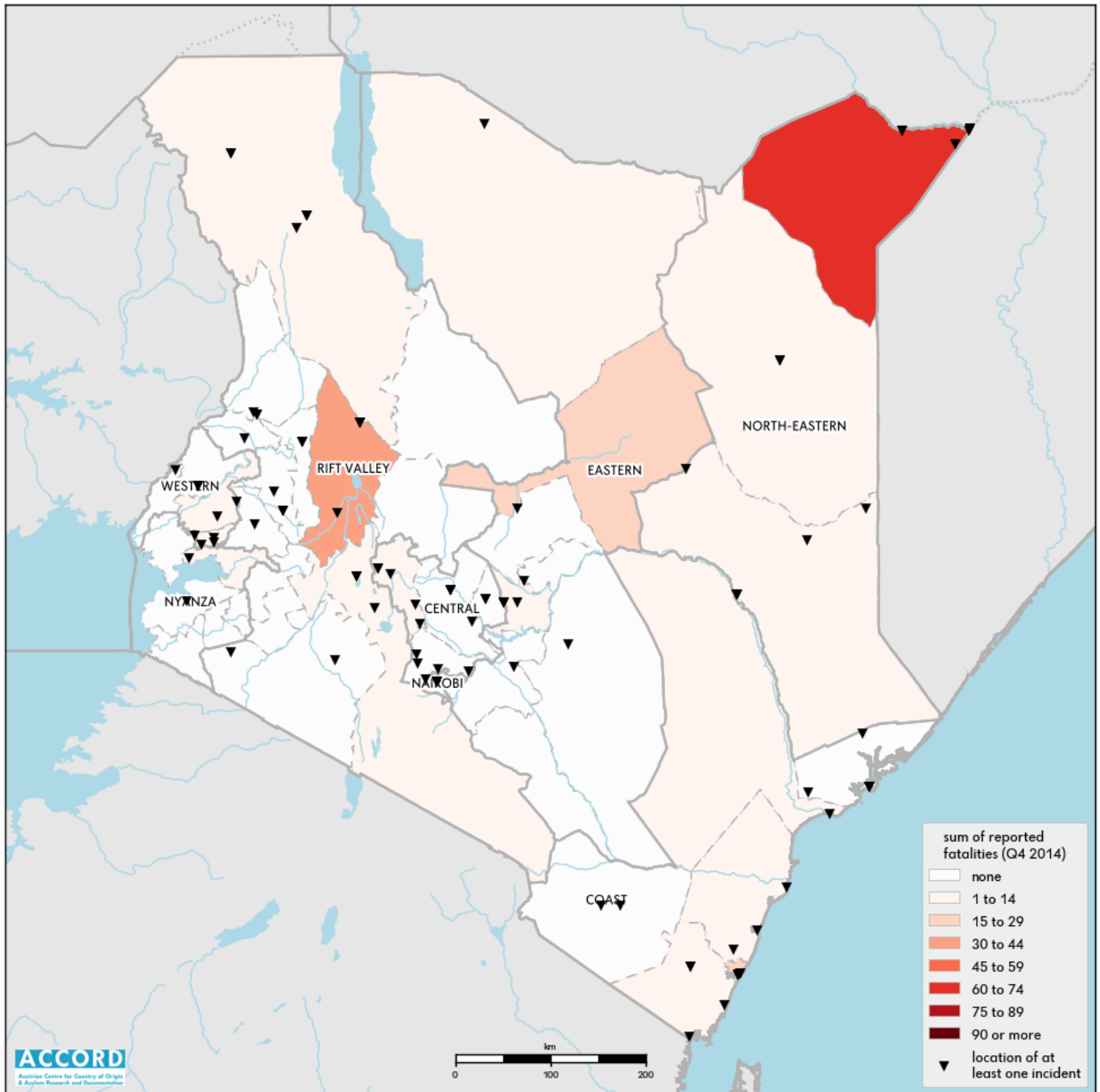


# KENYA, FOURTH QUARTER 2014:

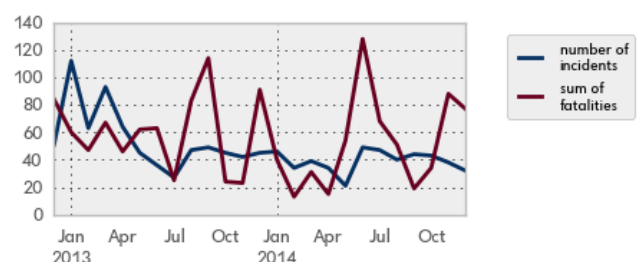

## LOCALIZATION OF CONFLICT INCIDENTS

Note: The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the map above.

In **Central**, 17 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: Gilgil, Juja, Kerugoya, Kinale, Kinangop, Kwambira, Muranga, Ndumberi, Nyandarua, Nyeri, Ol Kalou, Uthiru.

In **Coast**, 25 incidents killing 29 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Diani, Kaloleni, Kilifi, Kipini, Kisauni, Kizingo, Lamu, Maguguni, Malindi, Milimani, Mombasa, Nyangoro, Taita Taveta, Voi.

In **Eastern**, 11 incidents killing 32 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Chuka, Dukana, Embu, Isiolo, Mado Gashi, Matuu, Mwingi, Ryando.

In **Nairobi**, 8 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: Nairobi.

In **North-Eastern**, 15 incidents killing 77 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Bula Dawa, Dadaab Refugee Camp, Garissa, Koromi, Liboi, Mandera, Omar Jilo, Rhamu, Wajir.

In **Nyanza**, 3 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: Homa Bay, Nyatike, Yala.

In **Rift Valley**, 26 incidents killing 52 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Chemoe, Cheptiret, Eburu, Eldoret, Elegeyo-Marakwet, Kainuk, Kakuma, Kapedo, Kapenguria, Kapsabet, Kilgoris, Kitale, Lodwar, Makutano, Nakuru, Narok.

In **Western**, 8 incidents killing 7 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Bungoma, Kakamega, Majengo, Maseno, Obasari, Teso North, Vihiga.

## METHODOLOGY

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location and Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Kenya being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type. Based on these data, the Austrian Center for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battle, headquarters or base established, non-violent activity by a conflict actor, riots/protests, violence against civilians, non-violent transfer of territory, remote violence. For details on these categories, please see
