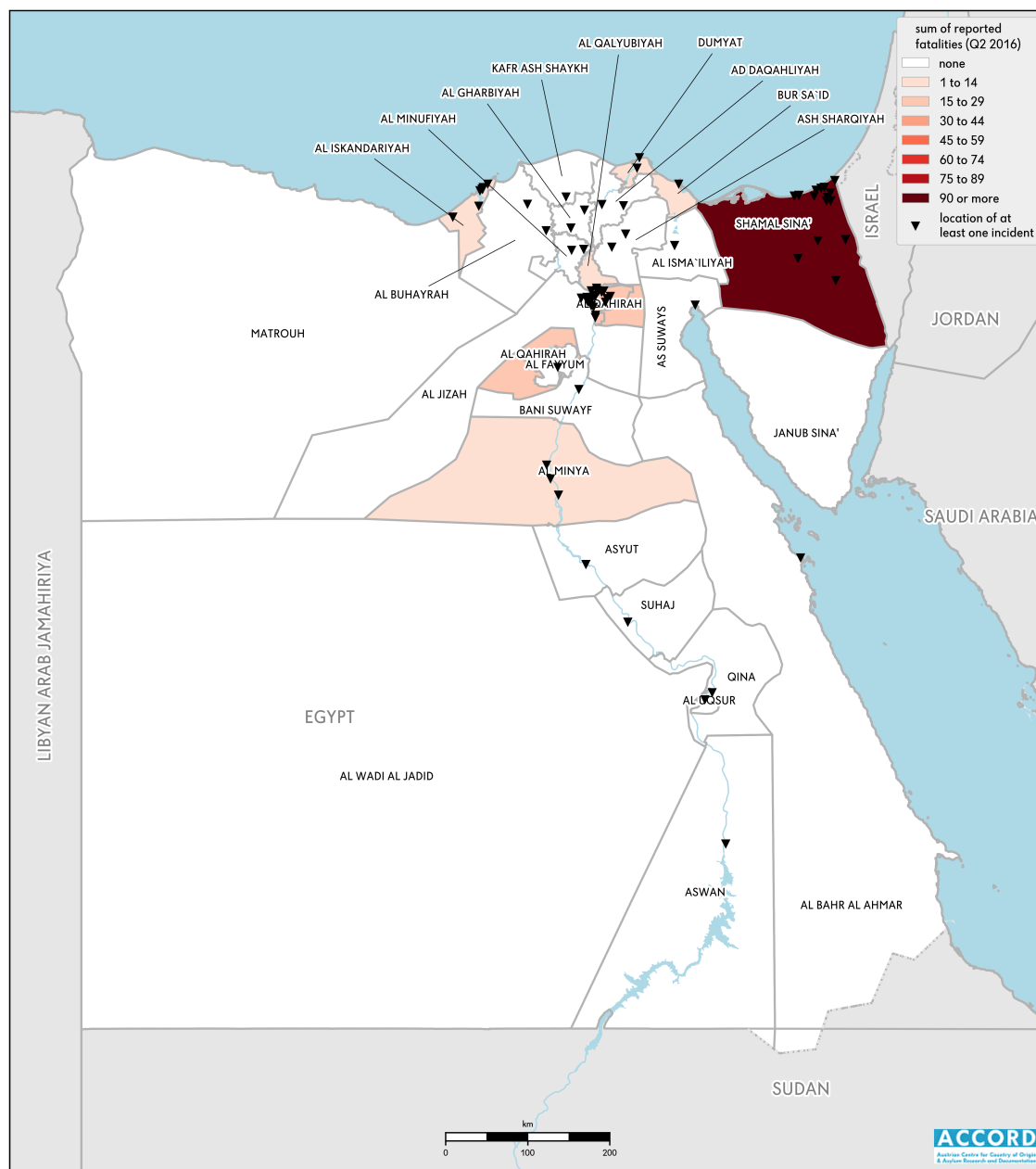


EGYPT, SECOND QUARTER 2016:

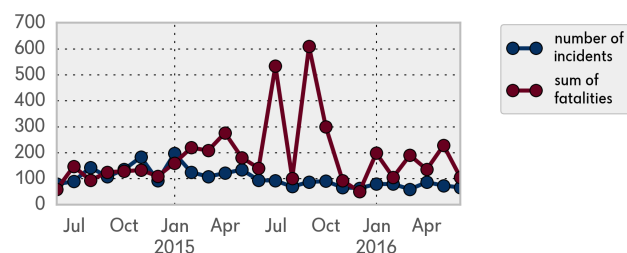

LOCALIZATION OF CONFLICT INCIDENTS

Note: The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the map above.

In **Ad Daqahliyah**, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Al Mansurah, Bani Ebeid**.

In **Al Bahr al Ahmar**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Hurghada**.

In **Al Buhayrah**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Damanhur, Kom Hamada**.

In **Al Fayyum**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Al Fayyum**.

In **Al Gharbiyah**, 5 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Al Mahallah al Kubra, Tanta**.

In **Al Iskandariyah**, 16 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Al Ibrahimiyah, Al Montezh, Alexandria, Ar Raml, Bab Sharqi, Burj al-Arab, Mina al Basal, Qaryat al Bayda**.

In **Al Isma'iliyah**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Ismailia**.

In **Al Jizah**, 16 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Al Agouza, Al Jizah, Boulaq Ad Dakrou, Dokki, Faysal, Mohandiseen, Nahiya, Oula**.

In **Al Minufiyah**, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Quwaysina, Shibin al Kawm**.

In **Al Minya**, 4 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Al Karm ash Sharqi, Kawm al Lufi, Minya**.

In **Al Qahirah**, 52 incidents killing 15 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ain Shams, Al Maadi, Al Qasr al Ayni, Al Rehab, Bab al Luq, Cairo, Cairo International Airport, El-Sayeda Zainab, Ezbet el-Auqat, Fifth Settlement, Halwan, Heliopolis, Maydan Alf Maskan, Nasr City, New Cairo City, Qasr Al-Nile, Tahrir Square, Tura Prison**.

In **Al Qalyubiyah**, 2 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Al Khusus, Shubra al Khaymah**.

In **Al Uqsur**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Luxor**.

In **As Suways**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Suez**.

In **Ash Sharqiyah**, 4 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Abu Kabir, Zagazig**.

In **Aswan**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Aswan**.

In **Asyut**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Asyut**.

In **Bani Suwayf**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Bani Suwayf**.

In **Bur Sa'id**, 1 incident killing 1 person was reported. The following location was affected: **Port Fouad**.

In **Dumyat**, 2 incidents killing 7 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Damietta, Ras al Barr**.

In **Kafr ash Shaykh**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Kafr ash Shaykh**.

In **Qina**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Al Ashshi**.

In **Shamal Sina'**, 99 incidents killing 442 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Abu Zamat, Al Arish, Al Hasna, Al Jurah, Al Qusaymah, Al-Goura Airport, Al-Khurayzah, Ash Shallaq, Bir Masaid, El Qawadis, El-Kharouba, Jabal al Halal, Qabr Umayr, Rafah, Sheikh Zuweiyid**.

In **Suhaj**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Sohag**.

METHODOLOGY

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Egypt being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type. Based on these data, the Austrian Centre for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battle, headquarters or base established, non-violent strategic activities, riots/protests, violence against civilians, non-violent transfer of territory, remote violence. For details on these categories, please see
