



LOCALIZATION OF CONFLICT INCIDENTS

<u>Note:</u> The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the map above.

In Adrar, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Adrar.

In Alger, 6 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: Algiers.

In Annaba, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: Annaba.

In Biskra, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Biskra.

In Blida, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Blida.

In **Bordj Bou Arréridj**, **2** incidents killing **1** person were reported. The following location was affected: **Bordj Bou Arerridj**.

In Bouira, 9 incidents killing 20 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Ahl el Ksar, Ain el Turk, Bouira, El Esnam, Lakhdaria.

In **Boumerdès**, **5** incidents killing **2** people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Boudouaou**, **Boumerdes**, **Ouled Aissa**.

In Béjaïa, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Akbou, Bejaia.

In Chlef, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Chlef.

In **Constantine**, **6** incidents killing **4** people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Constantine**, **Djebel el Ouahch**, **Sissaoui**.

In Djelfa, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Djelfa.

In El Oued, 3 incidents killing 6 people were reported. The following location was affected: El Oued.

In Ghardaïa, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Bou Haroua, Ghardaia.

In Illizi, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Illizi.

In Jijel, 2 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Bordj Thar, Taza.

In Khenchela, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Babar.

In Laghouat, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Hassi Bouzbaier.

In Mila, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Chelghoum el Aid.

In Oran, 11 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Arzew, Oran.

In Relizane, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Relizane.

In Sidi Bel Abbès, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Tessala.

In Skikda, 5 incidents killing 5 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Azzaba, Djendel, Kerkera, Salah Bouchaour, Skikda.

In Sétif, 3 incidents killing 8 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Ain Arnat, El Eulma, Guelta Zerka.

In Tamanghasset, 1 incident killing 1 person was reported. The following location was affected: In Guezzam.

In Tiaret, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Ksar Chellala, Tiaret.

In Tizi Ouzou, 6 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: Ain-El-Hammam, Imsouhel, Larbaa Nait Irathen, Ouacifs, Sidi Ali Bounab, Tizi Ouzou.

In Tébessa, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: Tebessa.

METHODOLOGY

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Algeria being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type. For further details on ACLED and for the full data, see www.acleddata.com und Raleigh; Linke; Hegre, and Karlsen, 2010.

Based on these data, the Austrian Centre for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battle, headquarters or base established, non-violent strategic activities, riots/protests, violence against civilians, non-violent transfer of territory, remote violence. For details on these categories, please see
