



Methodology

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Ethiopia being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type.

Most of the data collected by ACLED is gathered based on publicly available, secondary reports. It may therefore underestimate the volume of events. Fatality data particularly is vulnerable to bias and inaccurate reporting, and ACLED states to use the most conservative estimate available. ACLED uses the reports' context to estimate fatalities for events with reported fatalities for which the exact number is unknown ("10" for plural fatalities, "100" if "hundreds" are mentioned, etc.). Based on this data, the Austrian Centre for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents and publishes them on ecoi.net to offer another access point to the ACLED datasets.

It is advised to employ extreme caution when using fatality numbers.

Assessments of the security situation should not be based solely on quantitative analysis of event data.

Geographic map data is primarily based on GADM, complemented with other sources if necessary. Incidents are mapped to GADM provinces using the provinces in ACLED data. Province names and borders may differ between ACLED and

GADM. Incidents that could not be located are ignored. The numbers included in this overview might therefore differ from the original ACLED data. ACLED uses varying degrees of geographic precision for the individual incidents, depending on what level of detail is reported. Thus, towns may represent the wider region in which an incident occured, or the provincial capital may be used if only the province is known. Erroneous location data, especially due to identical place names, cannot be fully excluded.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battles, headquarters or bases established, non-violent strategic activities, riots/protests, violence against civilians, non-violent transfer of territory, remote violence. For details on these categories, please see

Localization of conflict incidents

Note: The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). The data's precision varies among the incidents: a town may represent a region, or the provincial capital may be used if the precise location of an incident is unkown. In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the maps above.

In Addis Abeba, 81 incidents killing 50 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Addis Ababa, Addis Ketema, Bole, Gullele, Jemo, Karl Square, Lege Tafo, Meskel Square, Nifas Silk-Lafto, Piazza.

In Afar, 32 incidents killing 42 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Abala, Awash, Aysaita, Badana, Berahle, Bure, Dallol, Deday, Dubti, Erebti, Gewane, Koneba, Semera.

In Amhara, 121 incidents killing 169 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Abderafi, Abyewalkaye, Amba Giorgis, Angereb, Arertu, Aykel, Azezo, Bahir Dar, Bati, Belessa, Bure, Dabat, Dangila, Dawa Chefe, Debark, Debre Berhan, Debre Markos, Dessie, Finote Selam, Gonder, Habru, Hara, Injibara, Jema, Kobo, Kombolcha, Lalibela, Mersa, Metema, North Welo Zone, Samara, Senbete, Shewa Robit, South Wollo, Weldiya, Wereta.

In Benshangul-Gumaz, 29 incidents killing 114 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Asosa, Bote, Guba, Oda Buldigilu.

In **Dire Dawa**, 19 incidents killing 17 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Adiquala**, **Dire Dawa**, **Jelo**, **Melka Jebdu**.

In **Gambela Peoples**, **6** incidents killing **7** people were reported. The following location was among the affected: **Gambella**.

In **Harari People**, **6** incidents killing **12** people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Abdul Kadir**, **Erer**, **Harar**.

In Oromia, 419 incidents killing 907 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Abba, Adilli, Adola, Agaro, Alem Tena, Alemaya, Ambo, Arero, Asabot, Asandabo, Asebe Teferi, Asebo, Asko, Ataye,

In Somali, 99 incidents killing 105 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Afdem, Aysha, Biki, Busa, Caligi, Chinaksen, Degeh Bur, Dolo Odo, Erer, Erer-Gota, Golocha, Hadew, Hadigale, Harad, Harerge, Hosale, Jijiga, Kebri Dehar, Mus Der, Shilabo, Shinile, Togochale, Tulu Guled, Warder, Welabu.

In Southern Nations, Nationalities and Peoples, 53 incidents killing 115 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Agena, Alaba, Arba Minch, Awasa, Bonga, Bume, Burji, Dila, Durame, Gedeb, Hawasa, Indibir, Inseno, Kele, Maji, Mino, Mizan Teferi, Shinshicho, Sodo, Tepi, Welkite, Yirga Alem.

In Tigray, 27 incidents killing 15 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Adwa, Alamata, Dansha Bota, Himora, Humera, Irob, Maychew, Mekele, Tigray, Welkait, Zela Ambesa.
