Presence: UNHCR has been present in Cyprus since 1974. In 2000, the Republic of Cyprus adopted its first refugee legislation and asylum procedures, and took over from UNHCR the responsibility for asylum adjudication in 2002.

Relief assistance: UNHCR donated material items for needs arising at the reception centres due to overpopulation, and advocated for safe zones for women and children and for the transfer of UASC to more appropriate housing.

UNHCR counters negative public perceptions with interviews, statements, social media depicting refugees' positive contributions, and supporting the promotion of human rights and social inclusion.



COVID-19 PREVENTION AND RESPONSE

Communication with Communities: UNHCR and partners have become more accessible to persons of concern through feedback and complaints mechanisms, Refugee Outreach Volunteers have been instrumental. The mechanisms have been effective in monitoring pushbacks in 2020 and enabled the prevention of refoulement.

Advocacy: UNHCR advocated for access to territory and asylum procedures and improving conditions at the first reception centre, focusing on the creation of safe spaces for women and children; transfer of unaccompanied or separated children to adequate facilities; improvement of hygiene conditions and prevention of COVID-19 among residents.

Inclusion: UNHCR has established collaboration with the PIO to translate COVID-19 information into languages of populations of concern; and make it widely available online, including National Vaccination Plan information.

Health: UNHCR successfully advocated for the inclusion of persons of concern in the National Vaccination Plan.

HIGHLIGHTS

Cash assistance

The Council of Ministers adopted a decision to replace coupons with cash assistance for asylum seekers, realizing one of UNHCR's long-term goals.

Vulnerability assessment

A vulnerability tool for assessing the specific needs of asylum seekers at the first reception centre was finalized in line with UNHCR's recommendations and implemented by the Asylum Service, UNHCR and EASO.

Integration

In UNHCR 2nd Annual Integration Conference 150 stakeholders came together to tackle the persistent policy gaps and the new challenges faced by refugees.

Access to tertiary education

UNHCR has signed MOUs with universities to increase the educational prospects for young refugees in Cyprus.





The UNHCR Country Office in Cyprus was delighted that out of 2,000 entries from 100 countries, one of the top seven winners in UNHCR's Youth with Refugees Art Contest was Maria Ilia from Limassol, Cyprus.



Key Priorities

- Monitoring and promoting respect for refugee rights and the standards of treatment of asylum-seekers, particularly as regards access to asylum procedures, reception conditions and detention.
- Influencing legislation affecting refugees and asylum-seekers by providing expert advice and comments on relevant draft laws to ensure compliance with international and EU standards.
- Providing technical assistance, legal advice and other forms of support to assist the authorities to further strengthen their refugee status determination procedures and ensure quality decision-making.
- Monitoring and advocacy to ensure that UASC have effective access to the national child protection system with respect to accurate and timely identification; registration and documentation; guardianship and legal representation; adequate care and supervision; tracing and family reunification by way of best interest determination.
- Training of key stakeholders from the government and civil society on basic protection issues, including refugee rights, reception conditions for asylumseekers, durable solutions and child protection.
- Integration: Promoting good practices in relation to policies and measures that support the effective integration of refugees into the social, economic and cultural fabric of Cypriot society, including advocacy for naturalization, long-term residence permits and family reunification.
- Promoting accession to the UN statelessness conventions.
- Strengthening and broadening public information through education and awareness-raising activities, working with the media, campaigns, seminars, events and constituency-building.
- Strengthening partnerships with NGOs and other civil society actors involved in refugee protection.

Working with Partners

- The Government of Cyprus is UNHCR's key partner in its mission to ensure the protection of refugees and asylum-seekers in accordance with EU and international standards. UNHCR co-operates with other bodies including relevant Parliamentary committees, Ombudsman, Office of the Child Commissioner, diplomatic missions and the media.
- NGOs and civil society: UNHCR has forged links across civil society. Currently, UNHCR has a fundingbased partnership agreement with two NGOs.

Statelessness

Cyprus has not acceded to the 1954 and 1961 UN Conventions on statelessness. Provisions in the Refugee Law, which allowed for the granting of humanitarian status to stateless persons in need of protection but who were falling outside the scope of the refugee definition, have since 2014 been abolished, rendering stateless persons without any means of protection. Most resort to the asylum procedures, irrespective of having an asylum claim.


