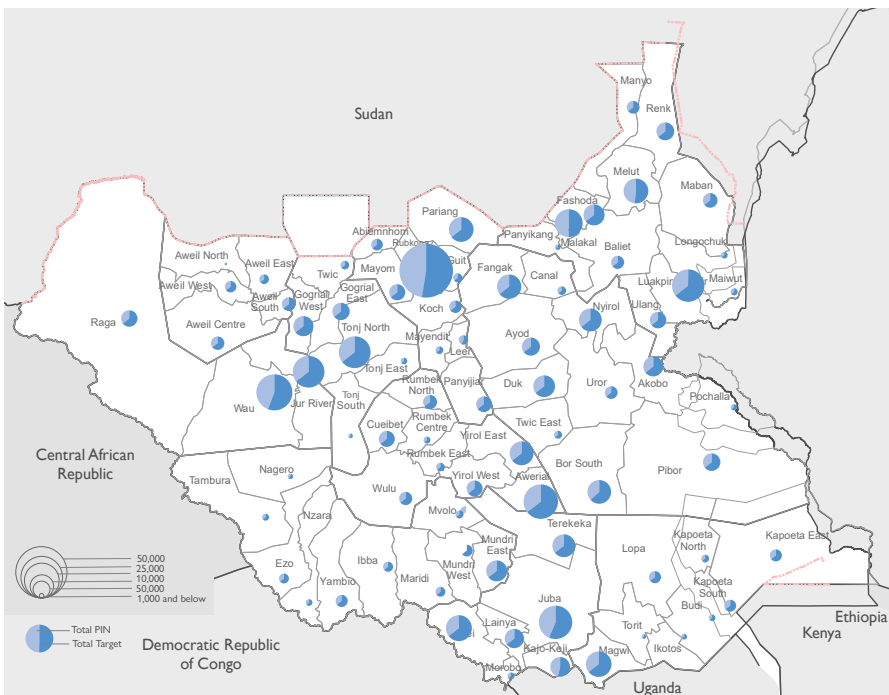

NATIONAL CLUSTER UPDATE

Building the capacity of the CCCM community in South Sudan, during the month of July the CCCM Cluster held its second Capacity Building Workshop of 2021, attended by 18 participants (7 men and 11 women) from NGOs with an interest in implementing CCCM activities as part of the cluster going forward. The three days training was an opportunity for the CCCM cluster to share best practices and global guidelines on effective camp management, as well as partners to reflect on lessons learnt and the challenges of the context specific needs of IDPs in South Sudan.

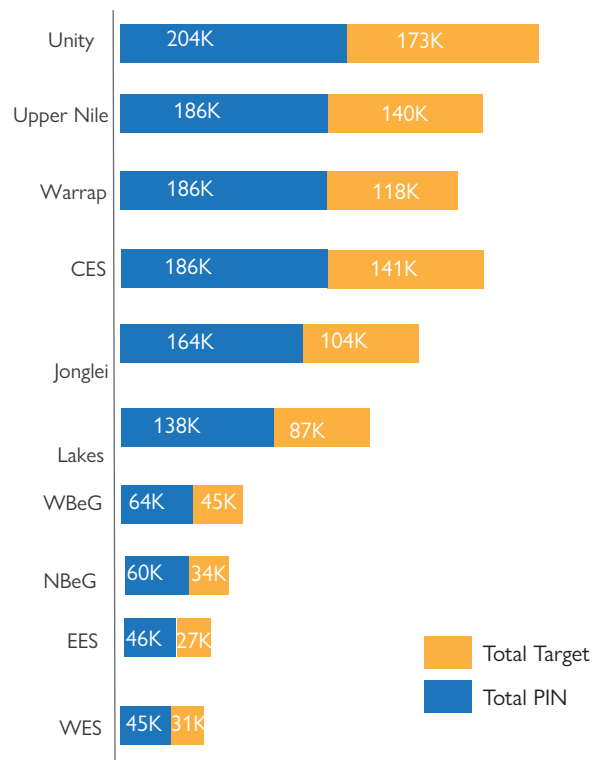

RESPONSE OVERVIEW

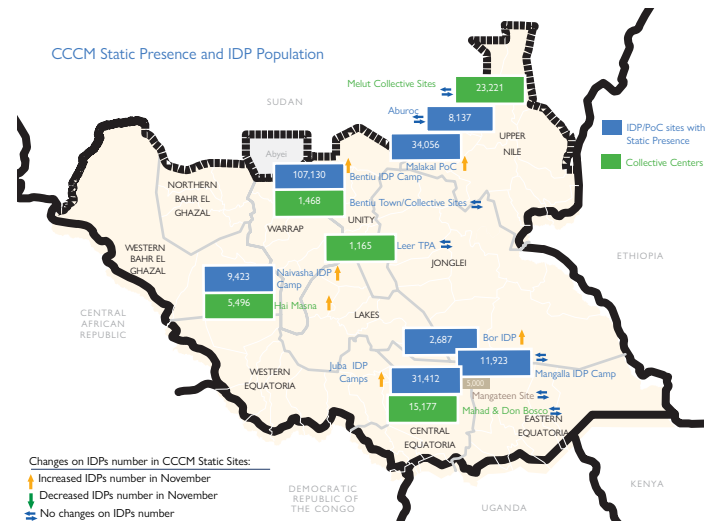
Of the 1.2 million people in need of CCCM support in 2021 approximately 872,000 displaced persons live in spontaneous sites or informal settlements or with host communities, around 187,000 are in PoC/former PoC sites and more than 231,000 live in collective sites. The transition of the PoCs to conventional IDP sites, which has so far taken for 5 of the 6 sites in South Sudan, may further entrench protracted displacement and the associated burden on displaced people, returnees and host communities.

Unusually extreme flooding, in addition to the upsurge in sub-national violence, especially in Jonglei, Unity, Upper Nile, Warrap and Lakes, means that displaced people are expected to remain in the areas where they have taken refuge until conditions improve in their areas of origin. Ensuring that these people continue to receive adequate services, and mitigate against protection concerns and other risks and vulnerabilities, CCCM cluster will continue to maintain an overview of agencies providing services, the quality of their services and identify site level needs and gaps.

As of July about 696,000 IDPs were reached by 5 CCCM cluster partners. who responded in various IDP sites and displacement locations where they provided IDPs with CCCM services including coordination of service provision, leadership training, and monitoring service provisions.

UPPER NILE

PoC & IDP Sites

- Malakal PoC has seen an increase in the number of organized gangs, mainly composed of boys, loitering around the solid waste site obstructing garbage disposal activities, and in some instances lighting regularly lighting fires to burn decomposable materials, a major health risk. DRC camp management have raised this issue with the camp leadership and community to try and reduce this harmful reckless behavior.
- Aiming to build the capacity of local authorities in Malakal, DRC conducted a three-day training on leadership and governance, attended by 15 people (10 M/5 F), to enable them to effectively and adequately meet the needs of their community.

Covid-19 Update

- Camp management mobilized the IDP community leadership of Malakal PoC for the launch of the COVAX vaccination by humanitarian partners (UNICEF, IOM, WHO and DRC) in the IOM clinic within in the site, and to advise them to encourage participation in the vaccine roll out.
- Wash cluster donated 164 hand washing buckets and 5 cartons of washing soap for hand washing in communal areas like markets and community centers in Makalal PoC, Malakal town and Wau-shilluk.

CENTRAL EQUATORIA

Former PoC & IDP Sites

- The distribution of the S/NFI materials by ACTED camp management and shelter/NFI partner HDC has been completed successfully for the 34 HHs/223 individuals new arrivals displaced as a consequence of the fighting in Yei.
- UNMISS Battalion from Rwanda and Ethiopian troop undertook work to clear the garbage and desludge all the latrines across Juba IDP Camp3. Moreover, ACTED camp management mobilized 55 casual workers to engage in waste disposal and assist in hygiene promotion activities.
- Following the recommendations of the Joint Safety Audit earlier this year, IsraAID INGO has been able to secure funding to conduct WASH activities in Juba IDP camps 1 and 3, in addition to providing protection support to vulnerable groups.

Covid-19 Update

- ACTED and partners are carrying out COVID-19 awareness across both Juba IDP camps with messages recorded in Arabic, English, Nuer broadcast over loud speakers.

JONGLEI

Former PoC & IDP Sites

- ACTED camp management distributed NFIs (1 blankets, 1 sleeping mat and 1 mosquito nets) to 100 new arrivals families following requests for assistance made via the Complaints and Response desk in the IDP site.
- The issue of the 800HHs unregistered new arrivals, who came from flood affected villages in 2020, and are currently unable to access any services, remains and lack of food is a critical gap. WFP Scope and IOM DTM are aiming to have these IDPs registered and verified by the end of this month.
- Following extensive damage due to heavy rains, ACTED camp management fixed 2 water pumps to ensure that the IDP community in the camp do not suffer from a lack of water services.

Covid-19 Update

- Camp management staff continue to broadcast COVID-19 awareness messaging using loud speakers and door to door communication to ensure that the IDP community are fully aware of virus prevention measures.

UNITY

Former PoC & IDP Sites

- To secure the IDP site from criminal activities, the authorities in Unity State, in consultation with the community leadership in Bentiu IDP camp, have declared a night curfew from 7 pm to 6 am, in addition to deploying joint security forces (comprising of SPLA-IO and SSPDF) to provide security.
- In response to the increase in cases of malaria and water borne diseases, the IDP community have been advised to sleep under mosquito nets and prevent children from playing or swimming in pools of stagnant water.
- Empowering and engaging adolescent girls in productive, potentially livelihood income generating activities, IOM camp management distributed embroidery and crocheting materials. This support it is hoped will assist in mitigating early child marriages, early pregnancies and other prevailing GBV issues in the IDP camp.

Covid-19 Update

- Camp management along with a health practitioner participated in several talk shows on Kondial FM 97.2 to highlight COVID-19 preventive measures as well as debunk prevailing rumors on the virus.

WESTERN BAHR EL GHAZAL

Former PoC & IDP Sites

- IOM Camp Management continued to assist the IOM DTM team in the verification exercise of the IDP population in Hai Masna.
- During the month of July, 15 women, 2 of whom were persons living with disabilities, were trained on knitting and sewing by facilitators in Naivasha IDP camp to enable them to be self-sufficient and earn a living through these activities.
- SNFI partners distributed kits to new arrivals in Naivasha camp, many of whom are extremely vulnerable individuals and require shelter support.

Covid-19 Update

- Camp management is disseminating messages related to COVID 19 prevention measures, reaching the communities through messaging on portable sound systems, in addition to door to door sensitization, particularly for the most vulnerable.

Assessments and Mobile Response

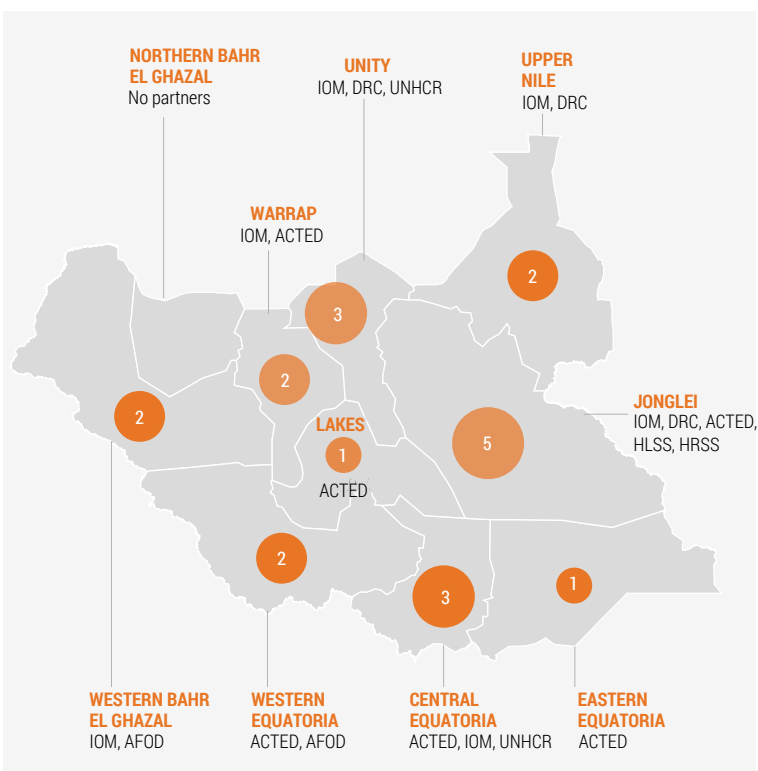
ASSESSMENTS AND MOBILE RESPONSE

ACTED Mobile CCCM team undertook a scoping assessment mission to Kajo Keji, an area which close to 28,000 IDPs residing in Logo boma. Following the needs identified the CCCM national cluster approved a Mobile intervention by ACTED. In Tong, following requests from the community leaders during previous visits, IOM camp management constructed a community center and furnished it with 15 plastic chairs, 2 plastic tables, 24 pens and 6 counter books.

NEW DISPLACEMENTS SITES

- [Gogrial West, Warrap] According to local authorities, floods affected farms and displaced population from villages in Akon South and North Payams, with initial information suggesting 922 households were displaced from villages in Akon South and 2,000 households from Akon North.
- [Tonj South, Warrap] Flooding was reported in Mabiior Yar Boma. DTM is gathering additional information to ascertain whether any displacement took place.
- [Nzara, Western Equatoria] On 31 July, local reports indicated that a heavy downpour resulted in flash floods causing displacement of communities living along the rivers Yubu and Singbi. Initial information suggests that Nadari, Across Nzara and Across Yubu are among the most affected villages. DTM enumerators are assessing the area to estimate the number of IDPs.
- [Nzara, Western Equatoria] There are reports that an estimated 117 HHs / 373 individuals were displaced from Tambura to Nzara following the recent conflict in Tambura. DTM is verifying the information
- [Ayod, Jonglei] Flooding was reported in parts of Ayod, especially Padek, Gorwai and Mogok. DTM is currently assessing the extent of displacement.
- [Malakal, Upper Nile] The DTM team in Malakal reported that 23 HHs / 84 individuals were displaced to Dangarshofuo in Malakal South Payam from Korwach, Canal / Pigi. The team is collecting additional information on this displacement event
