Registration

5.400 UNHCR identification cards issued

There were 23,300 refugees and asylum-seekers registered with UNHCR as of end-March 2022.

Community-based Support

Community centres provide protection services such as

support to child protection activities, catch-up classes for

children and legal assistance mostly on birth registration,

181,900 people received services through

Refugee Status Determination

73 people newly recognized as refugees

This is based on individual RSD assessments conducted following COVID-19 precautionary measures.



Community Mobilization

2,800 outreach volunteers engaged in 14 governorates

Mental Health and

Psychosocial Support

1,600 people received mental health and

Volunteers support people to identify common problems and solutions for self-reliance. They also provide first response and refer cases to community centres for further services.

Child Protection

750 children-at-risk received support

This support can include counselling and case management by trained child protection case workers.

Cash-Based Interventions

3,250 refugee households received monthly multi-purpose cash grants

The grants allow refugees to decide their most urgent basic needs while supporting the local economy.

Gender-based Violence

1,200 survivors of gender-based violence assisted This includes conselling, referral to specialized health services, protection interventions or legal assistance.

Shelter

830 households were supported with shelter assistance

This support includes distributing tents in camps, providing emergency shelter kits and repairing damaged shelters in urban areas.

870 people received legal assistance

This includes legal counselling and direct interventions before courts and administrative bodies to facilitate obtaining civil registrations or documentation.

This can include medical and in-kind support, rehabilitation



81,200 people benefited from health care services This includes primary health care services.



Winterization Support

140,000 households received winter kits

The winter kits comprise high thermal blankets, plastic sheets, sleeping bags and winter clothing. They were distributed to vulnerable Syrians in all 14 Governorates between September 2021 and end-March 2022.
