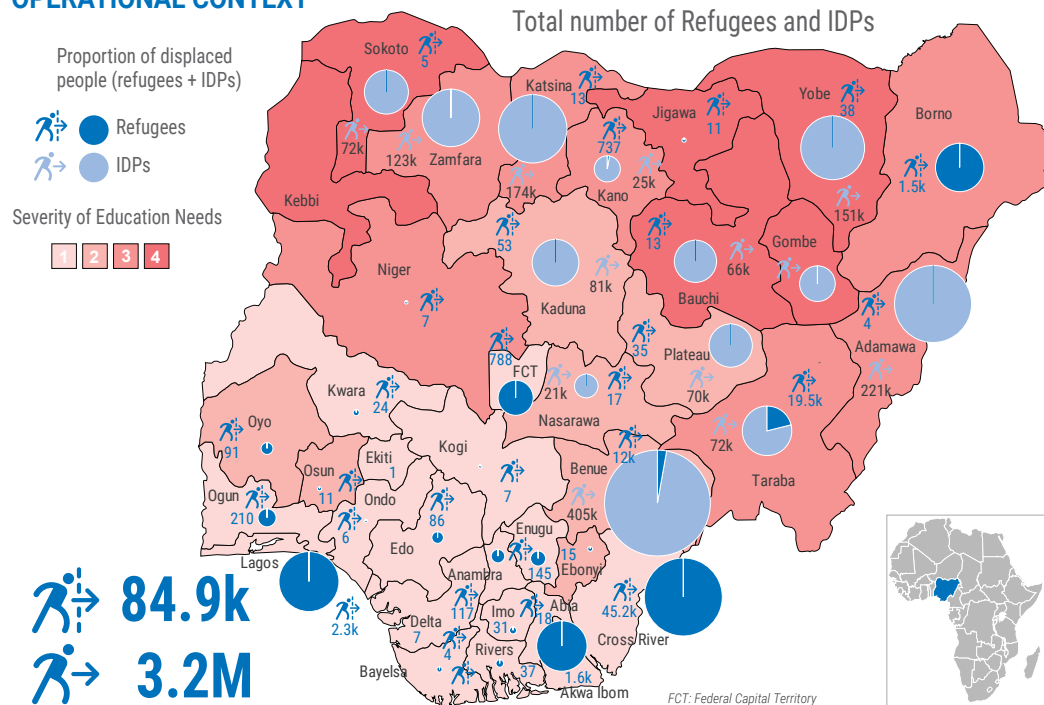
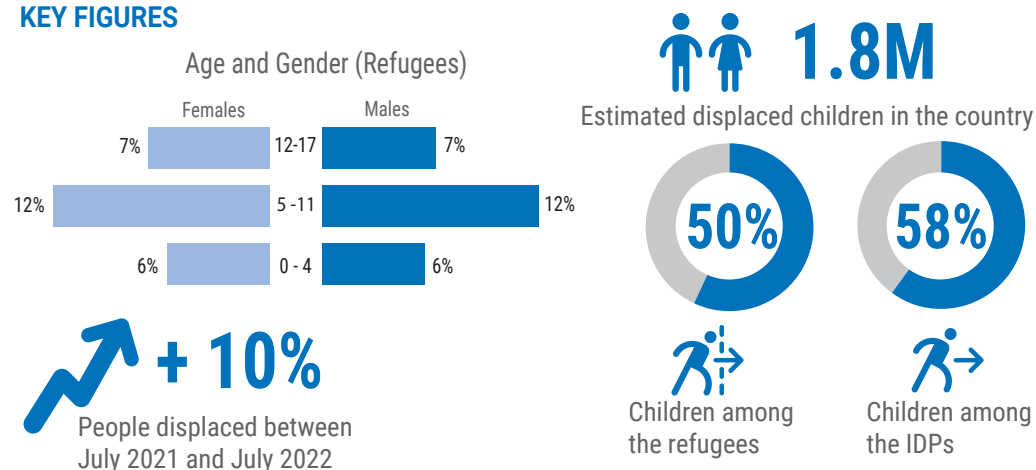

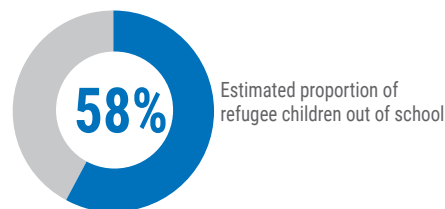

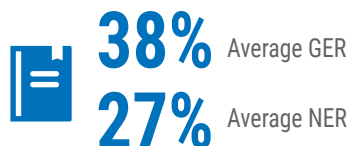

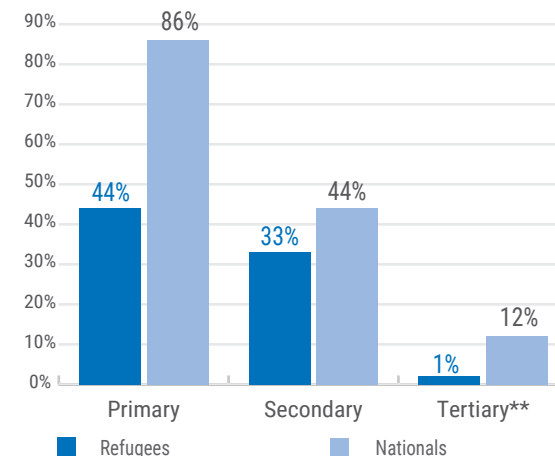
Out of school children



Average GER and NER: Primary + Secondary



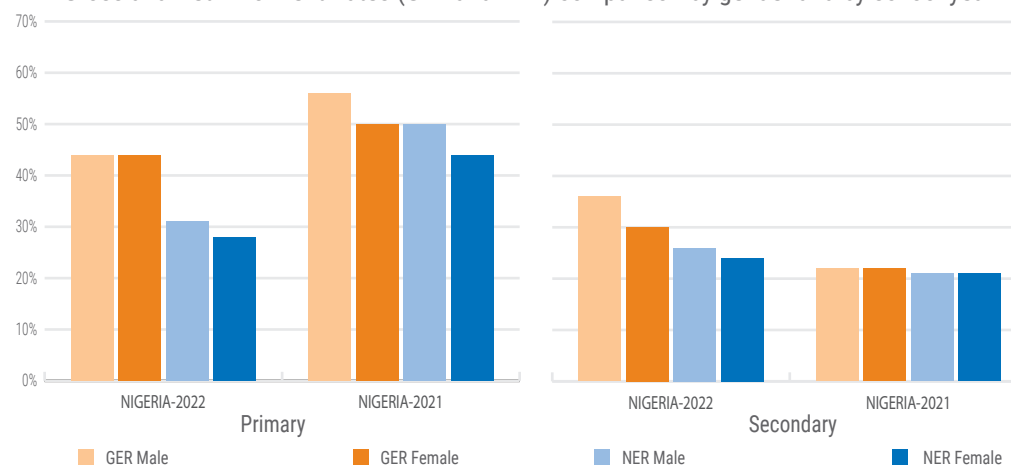
Comparison of refugee enrolment rates by school level for refugees vs nationals\*

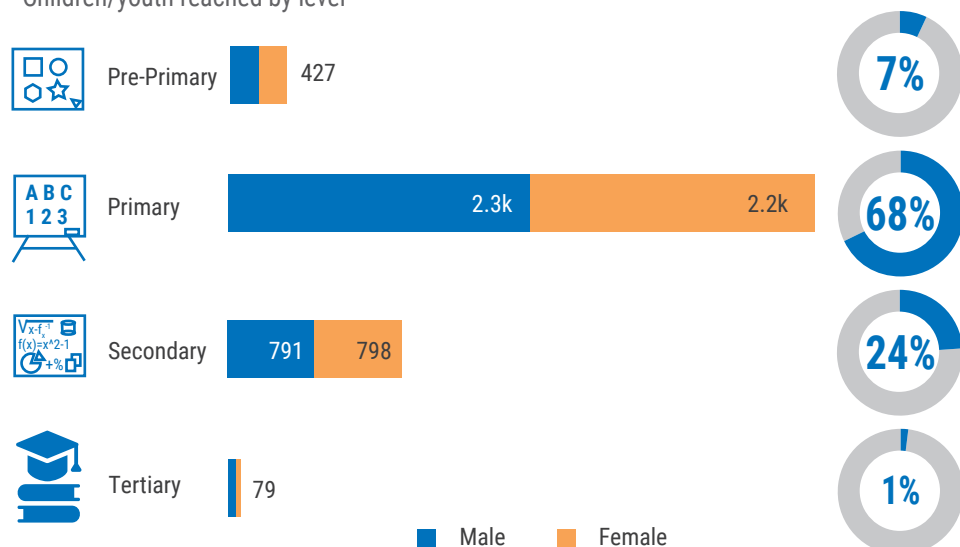

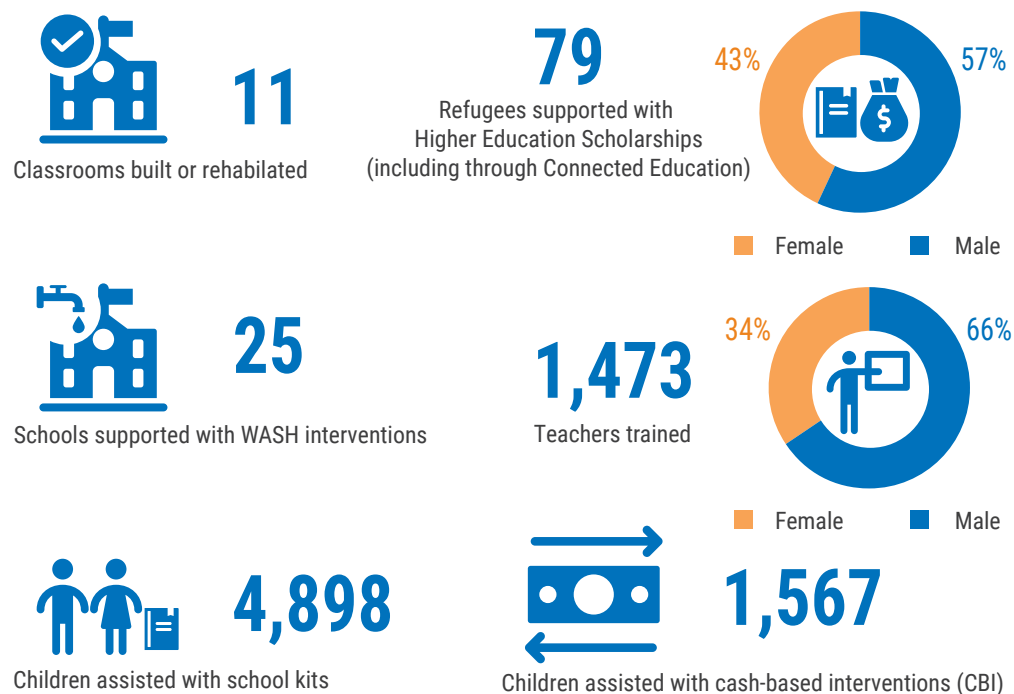
Children/youth reached by level

### KEY HIGHLIGHTS

- UNHCR partnered with ProFuturo Foundation to provide access to connected education, build teachers' capacity in digital education, and improve quality primary education for refugees in Cross River and Benue State. The majority of children supported live in refugee settlements due to budgetary constraints as they are more easily accessed by UNHCR and its partners.
- Refugee students in the host communities receive very little support due to limited funding and because they are dispersed across several communities in four refugee hosting states typically in rural underdeveloped and sometimes hard-to-reach locations. About 61% of the total refugee population live within these host communities yet are mostly left to fend for themselves.
- Huge gaps remain in tertiary education access as support is limited to DAFI, Progetto Mediterraneo, and UNICORE with limited scholarship opportunities.
