





Methodology

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Ethiopia being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type.

Most of the data collected by ACLED is gathered based on publicly available, secondary reports. It may therefore underestimate the volume of events. Fatality data particularly is vulnerable to bias and inaccurate reporting, and ACLED states to use the most conservative estimate available. ACLED uses the reports' context to estimate fatalities for events with reported fatalities for which the exact number is unknown ("3" or "10" for plural fatalities, depending on the context; "100" if "hundreds" are mentioned, etc.). Based on this data, the Austrian Centre for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents and publishes them on ecoi.net to offer another access point to the ACLED datasets.

It is advised to employ extreme caution when using fatality numbers.

Assessments of the security situation should not be based solely on quantitative analysis of event data.

Geographic map data is primarily based on GADM, complemented with other sources if necessary. Incidents are mapped to GADM provinces using the provinces in ACLED data. Province names and borders may differ between ACLED and GADM. Incidents that could not be located are ignored. The numbers included in this overview might therefore differ from the original ACLED data. ACLED uses varying degrees of geographic precision for the individual incidents, depending on what level of detail is reported. Thus, towns may represent the wider region in which an incident occured, or the provincial capital may be used if only the province is known. Erroneous location data, especially due to identical place names, cannot be fully excluded.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battles, violence against civilians, remote violence, riots/protests, non-violent strategic activities. For details on these categories, please see

Localization of conflict incidents

Note: The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). The data's precision varies among the incidents: a town may represent a region, or the provincial capital may be used if the precise location of an incident is unkown. In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the maps above.

In Addis Abeba, 11 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Addis Ababa, Addis Ababa University, Lideta, Mesqel Square.

In Afar, 4 incidents killing 5 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Chifra, Semera, Wesen Kurkur.

In Amhara, 60 incidents killing 104 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Abderafi, Ataye, Bahir Dar, Bati, Bistima, Chomiye 13, Dangur, Debark, Debre Markos, Dessie, Finote Selam, Gobiye, Gonder, Grar Wuha, Jerota, Kemise, Kewet, Kobo, Kobo Robit, Mer Awi, Metema, Molale, Motta, Senbete, Seraba, Shewa Robit, Weldiya, Wetwet, Zembo.

In Benshangul-Gumaz, 14 incidents killing 173 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Bambasi, Belo Jiganfoy, Bulen, Dibate, Kamashi Town, Manbuk, Mandura.

In **Dire Dawa**, **1** incident killing **1** person was reported. The following location was among the affected: **Dire Dawa**.

In **Gambela Peoples**, **14** incidents killing **107** people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Dimma, Gambella, Itang, Merkez**.

In **Harari People**, **1** incident killing **0** people was reported. The following location was among the affected: **Harar**.

In Oromia, 193 incidents killing 1421 people were reported. In Southern Nations, Nationalities and Peoples, 43 incidents killing 46 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Alem Gebeya, Buniti, Bura, Chire Town, Echama, Gato, Gazer, Gidole, Gumayde, Hawasa, Holte, Hosaena, Jinka, K'ebalenka, Kelle Town, Soyema, Worabe.

In Tigray, 15 incidents killing 127 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: Adi Awala, Mekele, Rama, Sheraro, Timuga, Tsegede, Waja.
