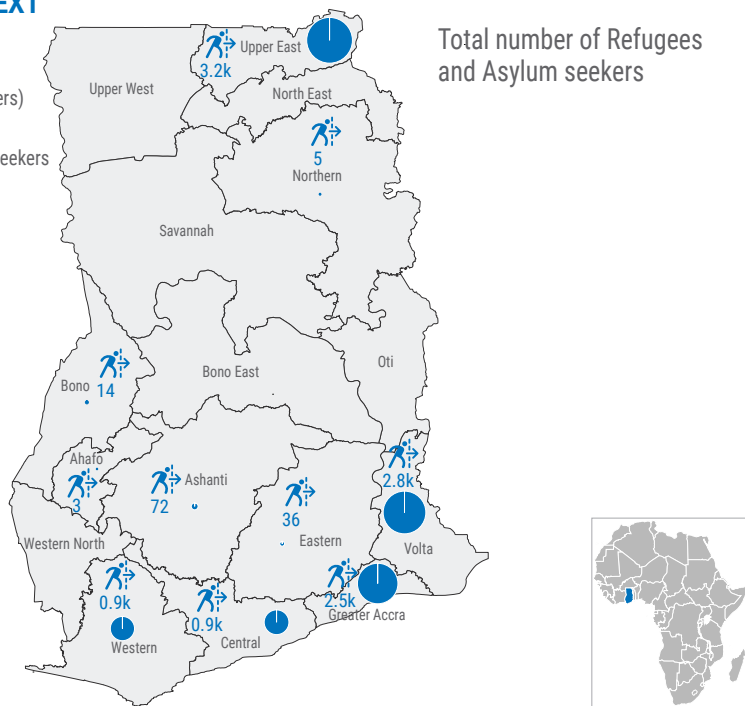

Proportion of displaced people (refugees + Asylum seekers)

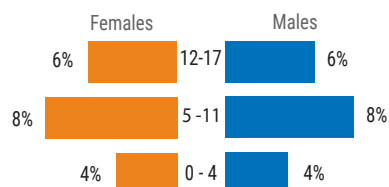

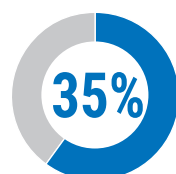

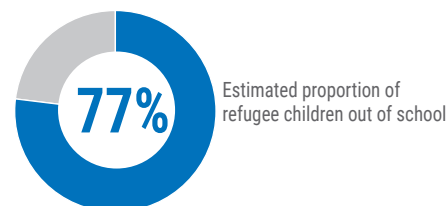

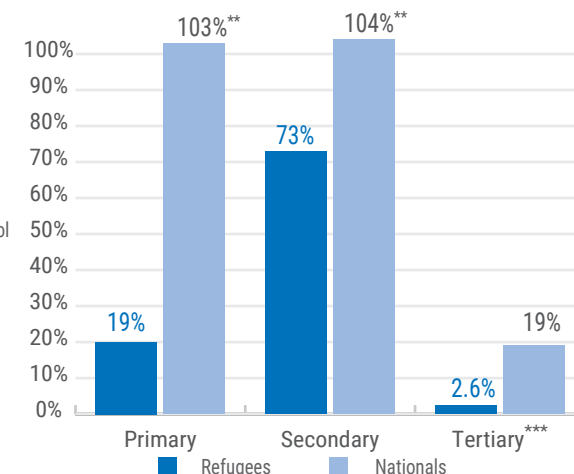

Comparison of refugee enrolment rates by school level for refugees vs nationals*

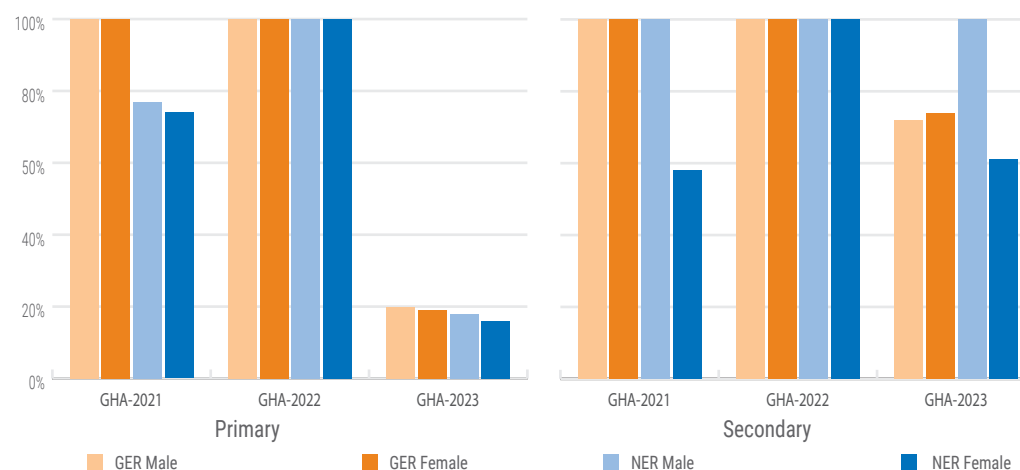

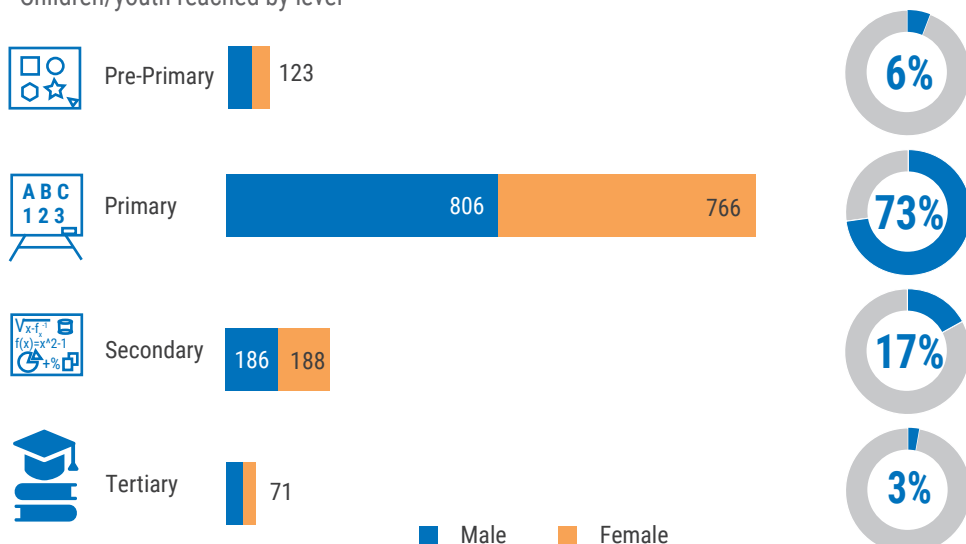
Gross and Net Enrolment Rates (GER and NER) comparison by gender and by school year



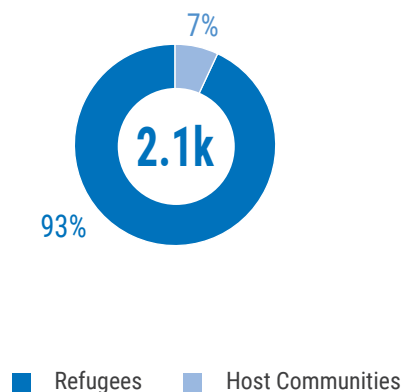

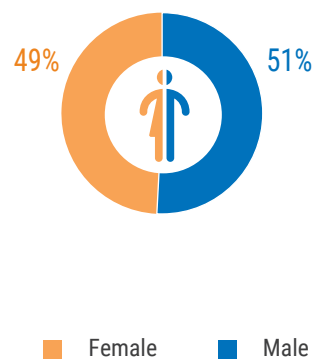
Children/youth reached by level



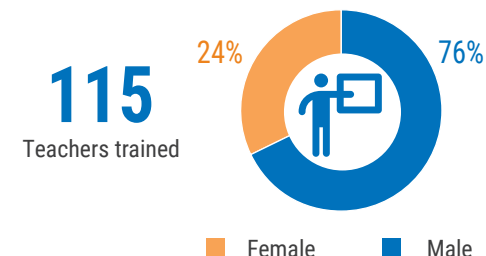
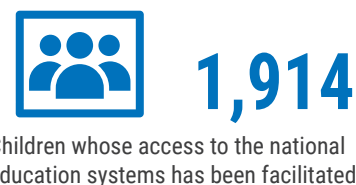
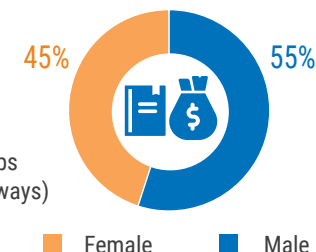
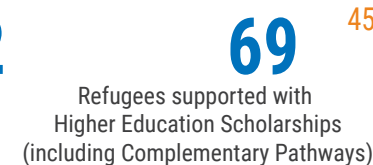
Children/youth reached by protection status

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS



KEY HIGHLIGHTS

- The 2022-2023 school year was marked by the voluntary repatriation of most Ivorian refugees (following the cessation of refugee status for Ivorian refugees, which took effect on 30 June 2022), who made up the majority of refugee pupils attending school in Ghana. This explains the decline in refugee enrolment rates, particularly at primary level, as many of them left during the school year. As those who remained in Ghana no longer had refugee status, they were not included in the enrolment statistics.
- During the 2022-2023 school year, UNHCR supported refugee children enrolled in primary school by providing uniforms, exercise books, textbooks and other school supplies. UNHCR also paid for exam fees and tutoring where necessary.
- At the secondary level, refugees attending boarding schools received a set of essential items for their schooling and boarding life. For those who did not have access to boarding schools, living expenses were also paid to refugee students who had to stay in private hostel to avoid long journeys to school.
- As a result of the growing insecurity in Burkina Faso and the spill-over of the Central Sahel crisis to the coastal countries, 1,530 recently arrived asylum-seeking children from Burkina Faso are not yet enrolled in school in Ghana. Measures are being taken to prepare and enroll them for the start of the 2023-2024 school year.
